A picture postcard is always welcome and cheapest to send. Members and supporters of NJPN are invited to join this campaign. You can include your name and address if you wish but do not mention ACAT or include a religious greeting or motif if so advised, since communication from a foreign organisation can endanger the prisoner. Several individuals featured in previous campaigns have been released. Sadly, others are still in prison and it is important not to forget them

1. Climate/Environment (some Actions and Events included)

Campaign Against Climate Change on the Budget

Claire, from Campaign Against Climate Change, writes:-

What we needed from Rishi Sunak was a Budget that set us on a path to transforming our economy, with investment on the scale needed to create climate jobs, cut emissions and lift people out of poverty. What we got was... not that.

Almost as an afterthought, a few crumbs of new 'green' funding were announced. Even added together, these were dwarfed by the green funding cut that the Chancellor didn't mention in his speech: the withdrawal of around £1bn from the Green Homes Grant. This was a breath-taking example of backtracking just a few months after Boris Johnson's 'Green Industrial Revolution' speech. After it was trailed, the Committee on Climate Change, NGOs, business leaders and trade union leaders (the latter via [our letter](#) to the Chancellor) all called for the scheme to be rescued, not cut. But these pleas fell on deaf ears. This half-baked Budget leaves a massive gap between the UK's pledges to cut emissions and policies to meet them. Nor does it solve crises in UK healthcare, employment, housing etc.

It's not a good look for the host of the COP26 (the crucial UN climate talks to be held in Glasgow this November). Campaign against Climate Change is working with the COP26 Coalition to mobilise ahead of the talks. A Global Day of Action is planned for November 6th. Because of the pandemic, local organising in cities and towns will play a really important role in decentralised actions as well as the mobilising in Glasgow itself.

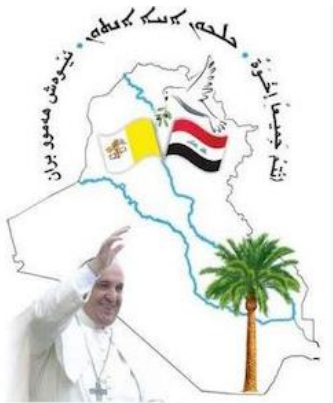
Cumbria Council reconsiders coal mine

Investigations into Israeli War Crimes

The Palestine Solidarity Campaign writes:- *'This week the International Criminal Court (ICC) officially announced it's launching an investigation into Israeli war crimes committed since 2014. This is a long awaited, but hugely significant, step towards holding Israel accountable for its crimes against Palestinians.*

Unfortunately, our Government appears intent on shielding Israel as much as it can. As we lead up to the UN Human Rights Council session later this month, the UK is poised to once again vote against crucial resolutions concerning Palestine.

With the United States blocking any meaningful action from the UN's Security Council, the Human Rights Council has become one of the few international forums open to Palestinians seeking justice.

The UK should be supporting any resolution based on implementing international law and accountability. However, we've seen a worrying trend in recent years of increasingly abstaining or voting against key resolutions - largely in an attempt to win favour with the US.'

In March 2021 the United Nations Human Rights Council will vote on resolutions concerning Palestine. The UK has a history of abstaining or voting against key resolutions... that's why we need to apply pressure now. Please write to your MP [here](#).

5. Refugees/Migrants

Praying with Detainees

Will, Detention Outreach Officer at JRS, accompanying those held at Heathrow Immigration Removal Centres, Harmondsworth and Colnbrook, and those who have recently left detention, writes these thought-provoking words:-

'Firm and fair. These two words have been thrown about by various Home Office officials over the last few months when commenting on the asylum system. A firm and fair approach is allegedly how we should be treating people coming to the UK seeking safety. We are told our 'broken' asylum system must be fixed so that it is firm and fair. Behind these two short, simple and otherwise innocuous words lies greater meaning and implications of the current path our asylum system is taking. Now, we often hear that a picture speaks a thousand words and if we wanted any clarification on the Home Office's interpretation of 'firm and fair' we would only have to look as far as the current use of alternative 'accommodation' provided to those seeking asylum in the UK. It will have been hard to miss over the last few months the stories coming from Napier and other army barracks that have been repurposed by the Home Office into asylum accommodation. Hundreds of men were housed at these dilapidated and previously abandoned sites, with shared dormitories and facilities making it impossible to social distance. A truly undignified place to be accommodating those seeking asylum. An indignity which was purposeful as it was,

unsurprisingly, revealed that when considering the use of these army barracks sites as accommodation the Home Office justified their use as housing those seeking asylum in more “generous” accommodation would “undermine public confidence in the asylum system”.

Not only should we have been considering the fact that the conditions of these barracks were completely unsatisfactory for their use as accommodation but also the impact that such accommodation would have on the individuals housed there. When people arrive in the UK to seek asylum, they have often made long and arduous journeys having taken the difficult decision to leave the place they call home; a decision we should not think people make lightly. Many will arrive with lasting trauma or experiences of torture or degrading treatment. Being accommodated in a military setting, surrounded by high fences and barbed wire, the presence of security and guards and cut off from surrounding community or support will be a reminder for some of the very environment and circumstances which forced them to flee. It is a complete lack of care to place individuals who may have underlying vulnerabilities in a situation which may compound or trigger existing trauma; something we are sadly all too familiar with in immigration detention. Evidently firm and fair meant undignified and uncompassionate.

When faced with such a picture of hostility it can be difficult to seek out where we can find strength to keep going.

As we begin this period of Lent, we take the opportunity to spend some time in reflection. In Pope Francis’ homily for Ash Wednesday he reminds us that this time of Lent is a journey. Like with any journey there are times we will find difficult and moments where we may stumble. But when we fall we are picked up time and time again. So although we can be faced with daunting hostility, and it can be difficult to find the path forward, we can always be assured that this isn’t journey we travel alone and there will always be someone to pick us up. In the final paragraph of his homily, Pope Francis says, “Lent is a humble descent both inwards and towards others.” As we journey this Lent we take time to reflect and to pray, spending time to look inwards at ourselves. But also, we reach out to others. In the small gestures of prayer and support we offer those coming to the UK to seek safety we reach out to those walking alongside us on this journey and together take small steps to break down the hostility faced by those seeking asylum and those detained.

So this Lent I ask that we find small ways to forge a new way forward. Instead of firm and undignified we seek to treat others with compassion and kindness. Rather than fair and uncompassionate we reach out with love and without judgement.

There is a better way.

8. Housing Crisis

Cardinal Vincent Nichols says "Secure decent housing for all" is the hallmark of a good society.

Cardinal Vincent Nichols, President of the Bishops' Conference, has welcomed the publication of [Coming Home – tackling the housing crisis together](#), by the Commission of the Archbishops of Canterbury and York on Housing, Church and Community. It is all very well the Government putting together packages to help young people with deposits, but one of the main problems is the affordability calculators that the Banks/Building Societies use. As my son put it, you might be in a position where you get declined a mortgage which would cost you £950 per month, and yet you may already be paying out a similar amount or more on rent.

9. Covid-19

A Catastrophic Education Emergency

UNICEF have recently reported that 168 million children around the world have been cut off from schools during the pandemic.

Furthermore, around 214 million children globally – or 1 in 7 – have missed more than three-quarters of their in-person learning.

The report, entitled “Covid-19 and School Closures”, says that 14 countries worldwide have remained largely closed since March 2020 to February 2021. Two-thirds of those countries are in Latin America and the Caribbean, affecting nearly 98 million schoolchildren. Of the 14 countries, Panama has kept schools closed for the most days, followed by El Salvador, Bangladesh, and Bolivia.

According to UNICEF, school closures deprive the majority of schoolchildren worldwide the scope to interact with their peers, seek support, access health and immunization services and a nutritious meal. The longer schools remain closed, the longer children are cut off from these critical elements of childhood.
