I was hoping to be there, but work/home commitments have got in the way. If there is some way that we can bottle the energy, vibrance and feel good factor of Flame, and bring it back to the parishes, and the organisations that we are all part of, then the church and its charities would be thriving.

Speaking from experience here, many of our young people (the TikTok Generation as I have heard them called) are more worried about which

Looking for Living Wage Champions!

At the Networking Day last weekend, Fr. Chris Hughes spoke about the difference that the Real Living Wage makes to people living in poverty. (This is not to be confused with the Government-sanctioned Living Wage, which will go up to £10.42 from April for over 23-year olds.)

Obviously, it is important that the Church leads by example, but unfortunately only five Dioceses in England, Wales, and Scotland, have become accredited Real Living Wage Employers. Those are Birmingham, Brentwood, Hexham and Newcastle, Paisley and Westminster. This is not to say that the other Dioceses don't pay the Real Living Wage, they may well do, they just haven't got the

accreditation.

At present, many Dioceses, quite rightly, are focused on environmental issues, but can these not also go hand in hand with social issues? After all, much of it is interlinked.

Would you email/write to your Diocese and ask them if they are a Real Living Wage Employer, and suggest that they go through the accreditation process?

2023 Season of Creation Launch

The Season of Creation begins on the 1st September, World Day of Prayer for Creation, and finishes on the 4th October, the Feast Day of St. Francis of Assisi. The theme this year is 'Let Justice and Peace Flow.'

From the website: - Prophet Amos cries out: "But let justice roll on like a river, righteousness like a never-failing stream!" (Amos 5: 24) and so we are called to join the river of justice and peace, to take up climate and ecological justice, and to speak out with and for communities most impacted by climate injustice and the loss of biodiversity.

As the people of God, we must work together on behalf of all Creation, as part of that mighty river of peace and justice. **'Let them eat turnips'**

You have probably all heard the above quote from Labour MP Ben Bradshaw, when responding to Therese Coffey's suggestion that we should "cherish" seasonal foods such as turnips! The Environment Secretary's helpful remarks were in response to the the supermarket shelves being cleared of tomatoes and other fresh produce due to the bad weather. The Guardian reports more here.

Having said that, after speaking to Nick from Riverford the other day, some of the problem is the fact that since Brexit it is now difficult for European growers to sell and ship their produce to the UK, so in the Netherlands, for example, they have a glut of tomatoes.

Staying with Riverford, their <u>Wicked Leeks</u> has an article on the tomato troubles by Nina Pullman. Just as relevant, though, are the comments that people post in response; the first one, by 'Sgl' says: *It's not only our inability to see the long-term pattern of the impact of climate change that's my real worry; it's also the media continuing to push this convention that the customer demands any produce from anywhere, any time of year and as cheaply as possible. We didn't demand seasonless, standardised, plastic-wrapped fruit and veg until the supermarkets educated us into their way of thinking. How do we re-educate ourselves to counter the power of the supermarkets and get a decent diet without getting into the class warfare of who tells who to eat what?

I second that!*

Also, not really climate- related, but in the same vein as above talking about supermarkets, this article from The Guardian is well worth reading: <u>'Food tsar blames shortages on UK's 'weird supermarket culture.'</u> Henry Dimbleby is quoted as saying (in relation to food shortages and Therese Coffey's response) '"This is a problem of market failure in the specifically British food system. It's going to get worse. The UK food system is, I think, unique – I don't know another system where the supermarkets have these fixed-price contracts with suppliers. So, basically, you have no effective market."

Everyday Plastic are asking people to sign their petition, calling on all UK supermarkets to remove plastic packaging from five top-selling fruit and veg - potatoes, apples, bananas, carrots and onions — so we can fight the plastic problem, reduce food waste and save money. Ministers told to get a grip on scale of 'forever chemicals' pollution in UK

The Guardian reports on Green Party MP Caroline Lucas saying that tougher regulations are needed and 'the UK government must get a grip on the scale of "forever chemicals" polluting rivers and seas and threatening human and animal health.'

Caroline Lucas said: A cocktail of toxic persistent chemicals is polluting our rivers and seas, infecting our food and water supply, and posing a severe threat to human health, marine and animal life. Yet the UK's chemical pollution limits are nowhere near international standards, and water companies' claims that blending chemicals with other sources to dilute the pollutants simply won't wash.

The offputting truth about Verra's offsetting

Homethings write: - Verra is a non-profit currently running something called the Verified Carbon Standard (VCS) Program. They also happen to be in

our greenwashing-bad-books at the moment.

The VCS Program is a scheme that helps companies to offset their carbon emissions. A company buys a 'carbon credit', which Verra spends on an offsetting project (where one carbon credit = one metric tonne of CO2).

This should, in theory, make it super simple for massive companies (like Shell, Disney, and Gucci) to throw some cash at the problem, tell their customers that they're offsetting their emissions, and give themselves a big pat on the back. And that's how it was... until researchers did a little digging into the projects that Verra was spending the *2 billion dollars worth* of carbon credits on every year...

They then go onto explain about the investigation that was done, and that there wasn't much in the way of climate benefits seen. They also say that 'carbon-offsetting is complicated, hard to predict, and measure, and will always take years and years to truly see the results.'

At the end of the day, we need to be cutting down on carbon emissions in the first place.

Christian Climate Action protests against West Cumbria coal mine

ICN report on the Ash Wednesday protest that Christians held 'outside the Leeds, Manchester and Newcastle offices of Ward Hadaway, lawyers for West Cumbria Mining Limited, and the London headquarters of Javelin Global Commodities, which has an exclusive marketing and offtake agreement with West Cumbria Mining. They called on both companies to "cut the ties" with the proposed new coal mine in Cumbria.'

Simon Schama urges UK Jews to condemn Israel's 'horrifying' shift to far right

This one dropped into my inbox this morning from The Guardian and I was very interested to read that British Jews are being urged to speak out against the "complete disintegration of the political and social compact" that underpins the state of Israel, the historian Simon Schama has said.

According to the article, next Sunday Israeli's living in the UK will take to the streets to voice their opposition to the Israeli Government.

The article finishes with: - Six European countries, including the UK, on Saturday condemned recent Palestinian militant attacks that killed Israeli citizens in the occupied West Bank and called on Israel to halt expansion of settlements there. "We urge the Israeli government to reverse its recent decision to advance the construction of more than 7,000 settlement building units across the occupied West Bank and to legalise settlement outposts," said the countries in a joint statement.

EAs spend three months in Palestine and Israel witnessing and monitoring human rights violations and standing in solidarity with local peace activists. When they come home they give talks in their local communities and advocate for an end to the military occupation of Palestine.

Again, <u>Vatican News report</u>:- After the tragic shipwreck off the coast of Calabria, Christians and Muslims call for joint action to support those who decide to leave their country, because it is "a human fact" that "calls on everyone to take responsibility".

JRS UK and Asylum Welcome talk about the impacts of immigration detention

On the first anniversary of the invasion of Ukraine, Britain's choices on refugee policy stand in sharp relief

I have often wondered why we have opened our houses and our hearts to the Ukrainians and not other nationalities. Is it a race issue, fuelled by the Government (as in, Ukrainians are welcome/ other migrants need to be sent to Rwanda)? Or is it the media? Giving prime time/space to the war in Ukraine, but ignoring the conflicts in other parts of the world, such as Syria.

Diocese of Hallam Group prays monthly peace rosary for Ukraine

The Catholic Network reports that on the 25th March last year Catholics in the Diocese of Hallam joined the church universal with Pope Francis for the collegial consecration of Russia & the Ukraine to the Immaculate Heart of Mary.

As part of their preparation and following solemn Mass at the cathedral, Bishop Ralph Heskett and priests from Sheffield city centre churches joined more than 100 faithful from all over Hallam Diocese to pray the Rosary at the war memorial at Barker's Pool, Sheffield.

This was a historic occasion, not least that the rosary was prayed as an act of public witness by the faithful seeking the intercession of Our Lady at this time of conflict in the Ukraine.

Following this precedent the rosary has continued to be prayed monthly outside Sheffield City Hall.

Church leaders targeted by Russian forces

Release International report through ICN: - Church leaders in Ukraine are being singled out for persecution by Russian forces in occupied areas. Evangelical and Ukrainian Orthodox pastors have been arrested, interrogated, tortured and even expelled from their towns by the Russian military and their supporters.

Occupying forces have confiscated church buildings and Christians have received harsher treatment at Russian military checkpoints, according to partners of Release International. The Foundation is one of the recommendations to come out of the Coming Home report, published in 2021 by the Archbishop of Canterbury and York's Commission on Housing, Church and Community.

Nicaragua

Unjust sentencing of Nicaraguan Bishop to 26 years in prison

Bishop Declan Lang, Chair of the International Affairs department at the Bishops' Conference, has been shocked by the unjust sentencing of Bishop Manuel Álvarez to 26 years in prison.

The Catholic Network writes: - Bishop Álvarez, the Bishop of Matagalpa in the north of the Central American country, was convicted on 10 February of treason, undermining national integrity and spreading false news, after refusing to be expelled along with 222 political prisoners opposing President Daniel Ortega's regime.

Easter processions banned in Nicaragua as Catholic persecution continues

Vatican News writes: In the latest move against the Catholic Church and government opponents in Nicaragua, the government of President Daniel Ortega has reportedly banned the traditional public processions of the Way of the Cross in all parishes in the country.

During Lent, and also on Good Friday, the ritual will take place inside churches and not in public venues.

In what can only be described as a rant, 'President Ortega launched an unprecedented attack against the Church, accusing the Catholic hierarchy of "grave crimes and horrors" and of supporting dictator Somoza, who was ousted by the Sandinista Revolution in 1979.

In his address to the nation, Ortega also accused the papacy of having supported Italian dictator Mussolini, and the Vatican of being a "mafia organization".

"I don't believe in popes or kings: who chooses the Pope?" he said. "If we want to talk about democracy, the people should first elect priests and the bishops", and "even the Pope" should be "elected by direct vote and not by the organized mafia in the Vatican.""

Wave of Murders after General Elections in Nigeria Forces Diocese to Evacuate Personnel

ACI Africa reports that after the general election an attack in Nigeria's Benue State left more than 30 people dead and staff at the Justice and Peace Commission of the Catholic Diocese of Makurdi had to be evacuated.

Human Rights group calls for the release of Nigerian teen, Leah

Leah Sharibu was 14 when she was kidnapped, along with 109 other girls, by Boko Haram in February 2018. Five years later, she has not been released, for reportedly refusing to convert to Islam. Christian Solidarity Worldwide have more details.

Nigeria's newest Cardinal shares secret behind the highest Mass attendance in the world

This really isn't related to persecution, but it is about Nigeria, and the reason I shared it here is because it contrasts so sharply with the persecution side of things.

According to ACI Africa, a recent study shows that Nigeria has the highest Mass attendance in the world on a weekly basis. A staggering 94% of Nigeria's 30 million Catholics say they attend Mass at least weekly. (to give context, only 17% of American Catholics attend weekly).

Cardinal Peter Ebere Okpaleke says it is down to three factors: - Nigeria's traditional worldview, the role of the family, and a sense of community within parishes have kept Nigerians close to the sacraments generation after generation.

8. Women religious at forefront of social action

Mill Hill Missionaries report on the work that The Daughters of the Heart of Mary are doing in India, training a work force within the church to create a 'justice-based society.'

Briefly, men and women from various congregations who attended their two colleges of social work now head thousands of projects at the grassroots across India and many alumni have started nongovernmental organizations and community-development programs.

"We are happy that they stand for justice, peace and equality, the core values of social work," D'Sa told <u>Global Sisters Report</u>.

9. UK's Human Rights Record

Anti-Slavery writes: If you had to give the UK a mark for its human rights record, how would you assess it?

Every five years, countries at the UN Human Rights Council do just that:

they review a country's human rights performance and give recommendations for areas that it must improve in. This peer review process is a way to make sure that states follow through on their human rights commitments.

The UK's human rights review was published recently and, sadly, it did not paint a pretty picture. Peer countries raised concerns about immigration reform, human rights legislation and modern slavery.

Now, the UK government has an opportunity to take on board the recommendations it received from peer nations and make sure that the rights of victims of slavery and trafficking are protected.
