# Bishops lead Christian march to The Big One climate protest outside Parliament

Premier Christian News report: - A coalition of Christian climate campaign groups is calling on Christians to back their demands for urgent action on the climate emergency. They are joining other protestors at the Big One event in Westminster over the weekend to press for an exit from the fossil-fuel based economy.

# Overturn the decision to allow use of neonicotinoid pesticides on sugar crops

I know various bee petitions crop up regularly. This one needs to get to 100,000 signatures to be debated in Parliament, and it would be good to support it.

The petition reads: - Defra has re-authorised the emergency use of thiamethoxam to protect sugar beet crops from the Yellow Virus. However there is widespread evidence of harmful effects of this neonicotinoid on bees and other pollinators, and its use in the European Union is banned for this reason. Bees and other pollinators are vitally important for the UK's ecosystem, and they are already in decline. The decision needs to be reversed.

Virginia writes: The purpose of this article is to show that what we do to animals is tantamount to waging an endless and unrecognised war and, much more difficult, to show that it matters.

Environmental Justice Foundation writes: - Deep-sea mining is poised to do irreversible damage to deep-sea wildlife and disturb our planet's largest carbon sink. Mining companies could be given the go-ahead to start mining as early as this year, but if we put enough pressure on governments to defend the deep, we can still stop them. We're organising a petition to the UK Government to ask them to stand up and protect our ocean - will you join us?

As usual, what is just as interesting as the article, are the comments that people have posted.

# Our gravest sin: denying clean water to millions

I have been on a water meter for years, and so I am quite mean when it comes to using water. We have a water butt and several dustbins that I decant rain water into from the butt when it is full up. At present we have had so much rain that I have said butt, two large dustbins, and one old disconnected butt, all full to the brim with water, so my plants in tubs over the summer, and any vegetables I decide to grow, should be ok. This does also make me aware of my neighbours' usage. Last summer I was aghast

that one of my neighbours left his front lawn sprinkler on from first thing in the morning, until the next day (he went out and presumably forgot it was on). Another neighbour a couple of times a year pressure washes his driveway...WHY??? Presumably they are not on a meter, or if they are, don't worry about the bills.

This hard-hitting article written by Tahseen Jafry (Director at the Mary Robinson Centre for Climate Justice, Glasgow Caledonian University) for the Catholic Universe talks about the recent UN water conference in New York. In it she reports on the horrifying fact that less people have access to clean water now than they did 30 years ago.

### **Vietnam: Sustainable Rice Farming**

Another positive story, this time from Vietnam, and the efforts that are being put in to reduce methane from rice cultivation by removing straw from the fields and turning it into mushrooms and organic fertilizer.

There is a very interesting video to watch through Mill Hill Missionaries, which explains the process. This is all part of an initiative by international rice producers to reduce methane gases by 2030; a declaration signed by many of them including Indonesia, Bangladesh and Vietnam. Unfortunately though, the two biggest producers, India and China, have not got on board.

Greenpeace write: - Schipol airport in Amsterdam has just announced that it intends to ban private jets.

A private jet flight causes about 10 times more CO2 emissions per person than a regular flight and 50 times more than the average train ride.

Last year a staggering 90,256 private flights took off from UK airports.

As part of this work, JRS UK worked with people placed at Napier Barracks for two years from when it was repurposed as asylum accommodation in autumn 2020. # Asylum seekers to be housed on Dorset barge despite local opposition

The Guardian have reported on the above, which has been on the news in the last couple of weeks. As the headline says, the article focusses on the views of people opposing it - some of them worried about the refugees, some worried about the impact on the town of Portland, as the asylum seekers will be free to come and go as they please.

On the other hand, <u>The Independent</u> appeared to have slanted their article towards the facilities that the barge has; until you reach halfway through, to this paragraph: - The Bibby Stockholm was used to detain asylum seekers in the Netherlands in the 2000s, but was taken out of service after an undercover investigation by a Dutch newspaper uncovered mistreatment by prison officers, rapes by migrants and fire safety failings.

Several migrants imprisoned on ships in the Netherlands are reported to have died, including an Algerian man on the Bibby Stockholm in 2008.

They then go on cover similar objections to those expressed in The Guardian.

### 4. Palestine/Israel (includes Events)

### Abū Māzen: 'This land deserves not walls but bridges to be built'

Vatican News share this conversation with the President of the State of Palestine, Mahmūd Abbās, 30 years after the Oslo Accords.

They write: - It has been 30 years since the historic Oslo Accords were signed. A time which saw the hope of peace ignite in the land of Jesus. Many things have changed in 30 years in that land: politics, its protagonists, international scenarios, but also Israeli and Palestinian societies. The expectations of that time have not been met: after 30 years, peace still seems far away and dialogue between the parties appears to be at a standstill. It has also been nine years since Pope Francis invited Presidents Shimon Peres and Maḥmūd Abbās (Abū Māzen) to the Vatican Gardens to plant an olive tree together. In our own small way, we would like to foster a renewed dialogue, we would like to re-water that olive tree wanted by Pope Francis so that it can grow again. We would like to retrace that season of hope by giving voice to the guardians of that tree.

# MAP calls for urgent protection for Palestinian children

# **Event - Human rights in Palestine: Responsibility and Accountability**

From The Balfour Project: - Our annual conference on Wednesday 17th May 2023 is entitled Human Rights in Palestine: Responsibility and Accountability, and is particularly timely. This year marks significant 75 year anniversaries for both Palestinians and Israelis; anniversaries set against a background of an increasingly turbulent political situation, escalating violence and continuing denial of Palestinian human rights. The right to national self-determination is crucial, and we continue to call for UK recognition of Palestine now, but as important to the lives of Palestinians under occupation is the way in which their human rights continue to be eroded by the actions of the occupying power; actions purporting to be security driven, but increasingly appearing to be designed to weaken Palestinian society, culture and cohesion and to isolate them from international contacts and support. Respect for Palestinians' human rights must not be postponed until their national rights are recognised. Our focus

is on highlighting international law and advocating equality now, setting to one side the form of a future political agreement (if any).

# Sobering analysis of current armed conflict

Mill Hill Missionaries have shared this article, for which they write the foreword as follows: - Three days of fighting between the Sudanese Armed Forces and the Rapid Support Forces (RSF) resulted in over 200 casualties, hundreds of others wounded and assaulted and extensive destruction of an already collapsed infrastructure. It is time to wake up from the trance that affected everyone post the 2021 coup and face the reality. There is no pro-democracy or pro-transition side among the parties in this conflict. It is a fight between two partners in one crime, 25 October 2021 coup, over the spoils of their crime. This is a war between two evils who both don't have the interest of this country in their hearts.

# WCC urges worldwide prayer for Sudan as conflict plunges population into critical situation

As well as praying for Sudan, the World Council of Churches have given a report from Rev. Ibrahim Wushishi Yusuf, WCC programme executive for Peacebuilding in the African Region, who says the current priority is survival.

He says: - Aerial bombing, shelling and heavy gunfire makes it impossible for any organisation to do anything. He also reported that the airport has been completely bombed out, with water and electricity cut off for most around Khartoum.

# **US** evacuates embassy staff and families, France launches rescue for 'Europeans and allies'

<u>The Guardian</u> reported this morning that President Biden has evacuated US embassy staff and their families from Khartoum due to the ongoing fighting.

They go onto quote a UK government source as saying: "Due to the increasing attacks on diplomatic missions, we will be evacuating our HMG staff as soon as feasible. It's likely any evacuation will be incredibly limited due to the small number of UK staff in the country, and British nationals should remain in a place of shelter.

# Five year old beheaded, 33 killed in Nigeria, Christian foundation calls for action

My heart just ached when I read the above headline. ACI Africa report on the news out of Nigeria, and the report that Christian Solidarity Worldwide have produced, in which they have called on the international community to put pressure on the Nigerian government to end the killing of innocent civilians in the West African country.

# Over 50,000 Christians killed by Islamist extremists since 2009, says report

Premier Christian News write: - A recent study has found that upwards of 52,250 Christians have been murdered in Nigeria since the Boko Haram Insurgency began nearly fourteen years ago.

The investigative report entitled "Martyred Christians in Nigeria" was published by Nigeria's persecution watchdog International Society for Civil Liberties and Rule of Law (Intersociety) earlier this month.

# 8. Britain 'not close to being a racially just society,' two year research project finds

The Guardian reports that 'More than a third of people from ethnic and religious minorities have experienced racially motivated physical or verbal abuse, according to the biggest and most comprehensive survey of race inequality in the UK for more than a quarter of a century.'

Nissa Finney, professor of human geography at the University of St Andrews, who led the study, said it showed racism was "part of the daily lives" of people from ethnic minorities: "The UK is immeasurably far from being a racially just society. The kinds of inequality we see in our study would not be there if we had a really just society."

It makes for interesting, but disturbing reading, particularly as you tend to think that things are much better than they were some years ago.

# 9. Charities protest at government plan to further criminalise homelessness

Westminster J & P and Caritas, through Independent Catholic News, report that Homelessness campaigners have expressed concern at the government's proposal to replace the archaic Vagrancy Act, with legislation that could punish homeless people even more. Under the 1824 Vagrancy Act, it is a crime to sleep in a doorway or beg. Currently anyone convicted under the law faces a fine of up to £1,000 and a two-year criminal record. People who can't afford to pay fines are often sent to prison.

Although the government pledged to scrap the Act in 2021, since then more than 1,000 homeless people have been arrested for sleeping rough or begging. On 26 March this year, the government unveiled their new 'anti social behaviour plan' - but rather than offer support to homeless people - it consists of a raft of proposals to replace the Vagrancy Act with new powers for local authorities and the police to move, or issue more fines, to homeless people "causing nuisance."

# 10. UK Aid: UK Government is robbing Peter to pay Paul, Christian Aid warns

Independent Catholic News reports on the Christian Aid response to the Foreign and Commonwealth Development Office's provisional statistics report on how UK aid was spent in 2022.

The report has revealed that the UK is spending more UK aid in the UK on refugee costs than in both Africa and Asia.

# 11. Local elections: why vote?

At the beginning of May local elections are being held.

Brian Austin, Laudato Si' Animator, has written the following article: -

If we care for our common home, it is important to vote in local elections, since the turn out is usually poor and therefore your vote carries more weight. We therefore have a better chance of electing councillors that will

make decisions for the common good, that is for the good of all, rather than for the few. Local councillors oversee the work of the council and set the strategies and priorities.

The main responsibilities of local councils affecting the environment are things such as housing and planning applications, roads and traffic management, parks and recreational facilities, recycling and waste management, and so on. Plus Councils can do a lot to influence businesses and residents to be greener. To find out more about what your council is responsible for, visit their own website.

Depending on where you live, you may be voting for different types of Council with different responsibilities, whether a Unitary Council, Metropolitan District Council, or County and District Councils, Town, Parish and Community Councils or London Borough Councils. Councillors are elected for a four-year term, and a proportion may be elected each year, every two years or every four years.

However, one common issue is the climate and many Councils have declared a Climate Emergency. But, of the 409 Councils about a quarter have not declared an emergency and those that have may not be doing very much about it. So, one thing we can do is look for prospective candidates that would support a Climate Emergency and pursue those policies. Has your Council declared a Climate Emergency?

By gambling on the price of food, these speculators actually pushed up prices, fuelling inflation and making food unaffordable for millions of people.

The majority of the estimated 2,000,000 people who have been forced to flee their homes since the military coup last year have fled because of airstrikes or the threat of airstrikes.

Without aviation fuel the jets can't fly. If they can't fly, they can't bomb. Tell the British government to sanction aviation fuel now.
