

ACTION OF THE WEEK



What can you do to help?

Can your Diocese, or local Council commit to being a Real Living Wage Employer?

Those of you who are regular readers will know that we had this as an Action of the Week around February/March time.

With the increase in interest rates, as well as the 10% increase in many food items, it is so important that everyone gets a fair rate of pay. It is not just a practical issue, but one that has a huge effect on the mental health of workers too.

Living Wage Foundation writes: - This year the Living Wage Foundation launched a Living Wage Places Network, where Living Wage Place Action Groups from across the UK come together to share their knowledge and experience and learn from each other.

The Living Wage Foundation's Living Wage Places scheme recognises and

celebrates areas that are going the extra mile by encouraging local employers to become Living Wage accredited and make the Living Wage the norm in their places. The real Living Wage is the only UK wage rate based on the actual cost of living, it's currently £10.90 an hour, and £11.95 in London.

Living Wage Places Action Groups are made up of partnerships between public, private, and third-sector Living Wage employers and civil society members who work together on 3-year action plans. There are now 16 recognised Living Wage Places across the UK, from the Royal Docks in Newham in East London to the Greater Manchester City region.

Last year four of the most established Living Wage Place Action Groups – Dundee, Salford, Cardiff and Bristol - renewed their commitment for another three years. At the Living Wage Places network launch in January, representatives from these groups shared why advocating for the Living Wage is vital for their areas and how to encourage more accreditations.

What can you do to help? Ask questions of your parish or Diocese. Write to your Council. Form a group.

(for example, recently I told the cleaning company we use for our church hall that we are Real Living Wage employers, and as such, expect the cleaners that they use to be on at least £10.90 per hour...and the cleaners got a pay-rise! It is as simple as that!)

Hunger in East Africa to hit new peak with one person likely to die every 28 seconds

This sobering report from Oxfam published on the 17th May was calling on the UK Government to urgently increase funding ahead of the G7 leaders' summit, which started on the 19th. Oxfam report: - *Climate-induced drought, compounded by ongoing conflict and high food prices, has leftover 40 million people across East Africa facing severe hunger - up by nearly two thirds from last year - with 85,000 people in South Sudan and Somalia on the brink of famine.*

Action - Choose Loose

If you haven't done so already, please add your name to this petition from <u>Everyday Plastics</u>, asking UK supermarkets to remove plastic packaging from five fruit and vegetable products - Potatoes, apples, bananas, carrots and onions.

Personally, I think it should be removed from everything fresh like that - I hate shrink-wrapped Broccoli as you cannot see how dry the head is until you take the wrapping off.

Action - Don't bank on plastics

In a different approach to the plastics situation, <u>Just Money Movement</u> is asking us to sign their petition calling on HSBC to lead by example and stop funding the producers of single-use plastics.

Event - Catholic Social Action Network on Environment: Investments as a force for good? Thursday 15th June at 6.30pm online

The Archdiocese of Liverpool has arranged this event, and they write: - This is a special one off event that focuses on the relationship between investments and environment. We will be inviting speakers to explore both sides of the argument, and seek to find ways forward in this complex area.

They have highlighted where you can buy Fairtrade beauty products, and I was very surprised that Primark was listed. You don't have to spend a fortune to do yourself, and the planet, some good!

Conscientious Objectors Day

<u>ICN</u> have covered Conscientious Objectors Day, which took place last week, on the 15th May. The ceremony in London remembered all those who have maintained the right to refuse to kill. The names of 85 Conscientious Objectors were read out and white carnations were laid on the memorial stone in Tavistock Square.

Christian CND: Reflections from Hiroshima

Liddy Buswell, Christian CND's Outreach Manager, has just returned from Hiroshima, where she attended the G7 Youth Summit.

She has written an article through <u>ICN</u> telling of her experience there, and that her main takeaways were of peace and hope.

The G7 Summit in Hiroshima – A strategic opportunity to make significant progress on the abolition of nuclear weapons

Pax Christi write: - In the lead up to this weekend's G7 Summit in Japan, our Chair Ann Farr and our Chief Executive, Andrew Jackson, joined others from Pax Christi sections in signing a letter from Pax Christi International to Japan's, Prime Minister Fumio Kishida.

The letter commended Prime Minister Kishida on choosing Hiroshima as the venue for the summit and encouraged him in his aim of using the summit to urge the G7 leaders to address the continuing threat to the world posed by nuclear weapons.

The letter points out that the G7 summit is a strategic opportunity for leaders to build on previous declarations, particularly those made at the Nuclear Non Proliferation Treaty Review Conference in August 2022, and reminds them of Pope Francis' declaration in Hiroshima in 2019 that it is not just the use of nuclear weapons that would be immoral but their possession.

The return of US nuclear weapons to the UK

Again, Pax Christi have shared this, and they write: - Many will remember that, following persistent campaigning, US weapons were removed from the UK in 2008. Their return would be an escalation of the presence of nuclear weapons in Europe - a dangerous step against the background of the war in Ukraine and the threat of the use of nuclear weapons that comes with it.

CND have produced a very helpful briefing note on this issue, *NATO nukes*

in Europe'.

On Saturday the 20th May they joined with CND and others at the entrance to RAF Lakenheath in Suffolk, to demonstrate against the return of US nuclear weapons to UK soil.

Archbishop of Canterbury on the 'Illegal Migration Bill'

<u>ICN</u> have reported the full text of Justin Welby's speech to the House of Lords on the 10th May. I am not going to bother printing the Prime Minister's response as we have all heard it through the news.

Gaza Strip's escalating violence wreaks havoc on children

<u>Vatican News</u> writes: - The escalating violence in the Gaza Strip not only continues to kill and injure countless children; it also has devastating long-term effects on their well-being, mental health, and education.

They quote Pope Francis, appealing for peace there: - "May weapons be silenced, because arms can never obtain security and stability. Rather, they only succeed in destroying any hope for peace," he said.

Nakba 75: Personal Perspectives

Embrace the Middle East write: - The 15th May 2023 will mark 75 years since Israel became an independent state, the realisation of a dream of many for a homeland where Jewish people could feel safe, but also an event Palestinians remember as the Nakba (Catastrophe).

We asked our partners, who are predominantly Palestinian, to reflect on what this 75th anniversary means to them. We are sharing their responses in this blog series: Nakba 75 - Personal Perspectives. Their desires for their children's safety and freedom echo in history. Our hope and prayers are for a future where all peoples of the Holy Land can live in safety and freedom.

5. Government urged to work with black church leaders on policymaking

Premier Christian News have reported on this new manifesto from the National Church Leaders Forum (NCLF), which represents black Christian

voices. With a general election in the next year or so, they want to put themselves forward as an *'active participant in shaping policies affecting Britain's black community and other minorities.'*

6. African bishops urge G7 to cancel 'unpayable debt'

Vatican News report on that the bishops representing Caritas organisations of 23 African nations have appealed to the G7 leaders to address Africa's food and climate crisis, and increasing poverty.

They write: - The three-day summit bringing together Heads of State and of Government of the world's most advanced democracies (United States, Canada, Japan, France, Germany, Italy, and the United Kingdom) kicked off on Friday, May 19, with an agenda focused on Russia's aggression against Ukraine, nuclear disarmament and non-proliferation, climate change, development, food security and global health in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Ahead of the meeting, the bishops representing Caritas organizations of 23 African nations appealed to the governments of the seven most developed countries to deliberate concrete measures to help Africa address the multiple crises it is currently facing.

We still need a debt jubilee: 25 years on from the Birmingham human chain

Tim Jones, from Debt Justice, recounts the day, on the 16th May 1998, when over 70,000 people joined together around Birmingham to call for debt cancellation. They surrounded the G8 summit that was taking place in the city calling for debt cancellation for 52 impoverished nations by 2022.

7. News from Catholic Aids Prevention and Support (includes Events)

The charity Catholics for AIDS Prevention and Support (CAPS) celebrates 20 years of their HIV peer support ministry, PositiveFaith.

Since 2003 CAPS has been a voice for people living with HIV in the church and across the country the members of PositiveFaith provide practical, emotional and spiritual support for each other. To commemorate '20 Years of PositiveFaith' CAPS is holding 3 public events this year.

15th June - The Power of Peer Support will explore how the meaningful involvement of people with HIV offers solutions to the challenges of HIV in society.

9th September 2023 - Making Faith Sense of HIV will examine issues at the intersection of faith and HIV.

3rd December 2023 – Our World AIDS Day Online Service will bring together healthcare professionals, people living with HIV, the Christian community and many friends and supporters to share experiences and thoughts on the ongoing challenges presented by HIV/AIDS.

8. Britain Today

Fair Fares in the North East, thanks to students!

Caritas Salford says urgent action needed after latest poverty figures show 10.9m now struggling to pay bills

The Catholic Network report that Patrick O'Dowd, Director of Caritas Salford, is calling for urgent Government action after the Financial Conduct Authority (FCA) have reported that the number of people struggling to pay bills has gone up 3.1 million in the past year (it is now 10.9m, compared to the figure in May 2022 of 7.8m).

Inflation has caused goods on average to rise at least 10% in the past year; those with mortgages and those who rent have seen their payments increase substantially; and let's not even mention the energy costs.

It really is a shocking situation in a country that used to be termed a 'first world country.' The full article can be read <u>here.</u>

The Last Word

44. Burning disagreement: the Witch Trials of J.K. Rowling

Many of us of over a certain age (and possibly younger people too) have thrown our hands up in despair and confusion at the gender reassignment and gender ideologies coming from our youth. When you get told by a teenager to 'respect their pronouns' and you have absolutely no idea what they are talking about. When you get criticised for calling someone a he or she, when they are quite clearly a 'they'. When someone says to you 'they were doing their hair' - and you ask, 'what, so and so and their mum' and you end up getting shouted at, as you should know that your daughter was talking about her friend, singular....yes, this is all personal experience here, and one that my poor old brain struggles to process.

If you recognise anything in the above paragraph, Jon Kuhrt from <u>Grace +</u> <u>Truth</u> has written a good article, recommending the podcast "The Witch Trials of J.K.Rowling." It covers J.K. Rowling's well-published views, but it also gives the view of those who disagree with her (and indeed he found the 'experiences and reflections of the trans people moving and powerful.')

His last few paragraphs are very thought-provoking and we would do well to heed them, in whatever line that we are following: -

It is impossible to pursue justice without provoking disagreement. But activism corrupts when it loses humility and the possibility of redemption. As the Hebrew prophet Micah succintly put it:

'Act justly, love mercy and walk humbly with your God'

We must disagree – even on this most sensitive of subjects – without seeking to silence, threaten or destroy others. To do so is not just wrong but counter-productive. To deny the legitimacy of questions, debate and discussion is to fan the flames of extremism.

So whatever your views or experiences, I would recommend this podcast. We can all benefit from listening to that small and inconvenient voice which says

'think again, look more deeply, consider this'.
