

NJPN 46th ANNUAL CONFERENCE



on July 19th -21st at the Hayes Centre, Swanwick

The theme for the weekend is 'Just Politics' and the aim is to explore the need for truth and integrity in public life. As people of faith, how are we called to work towards honest dialogue and respectful listening in political and social engagement and seek good governance in all seats of power; local, national, and global? What is our gut response when we hear, via our news channels, that the forthcoming election will be full of 'dirty tricks and muckraking'? How should we respond to such a depressing and alarming prediction? Is this the level of public discourse that we must accept?

Sir John Battle will chair the conference, bringing his vast knowledge and experience of Catholic Social Teaching in action both in the political sphere and community engagement.

During the weekend we will hear from Keynote speakers, take part in workshops, find resources and information in the 'Just Fair' and listen to the voices of young adults as they share their hopes and concerns for the future of our world.

Right Revd Dr Guli Francis-Dehqani, Bishop of Chelmsford, will explore some of the dynamics of public discourse, the implications for individuals and society, some possible solutions and opportunities for Christians and the Church to play a positive role.

Molly Scott Cato, Former Green MEP and currently Finance and Economy Spokesperson for the Green Party will speak about how untruth is undermining democracy.

Steve Whiting, former manager of the Quaker Turning the Tide Programme, will start to pull together what we have learned from speakers and workshops and help us identify common themes.

Colette Joyce of Westminster Justice and Peace Commission will facilitate the session with young people speaking about their concerns, what action they can take and what they look for from others.

The final part of the conference will be facilitated by **Fr Chris Hughes and Sara Bryson** who will share and describe how they have used community organising in campaigns in Tyne and Wear Citizens. They will focus on how participants accept the challenges raised during the weekend and how we move forward in our action for peace and social justice. PREPARING FOR THE GENERAL ELECTION

A Year of Encounter



CAFOD, the Catholic Agency for Overseas Development, provides practical support to people and communities in need around the world. But as part of its mission CAFOD also encourages Catholics in England and Wales to respond to the call of the Church to promote the common good. We are all invited to play our part in creating the social conditions necessary to build a world that reflects the Kingdom of God.

Last month, with the general election being on the horizon, CAFOD and the St Vincent de Paul Society (SVP) joined together to launch A Year of Encounter. This initiative invites parishes to

reach out to local candidates to find out more about their views on the issues that we, as people of faith, care about. And this is a great opportunity to share with them our concerns about those issues too. Now that the General Election has been called for 4th July, there is even greater urgency to start putting our parish plans into action.

As Christians we have a long tradition of being actively involved in the big issues of our time. From Catherine of Siena to Oscar Romero, the lives of many saints show us that the greater their devotion to the Lord, the deeper their commitment to addressing the social problems of their time.

The Church also tells us that "...All citizens ought to be aware of their right and duty to promote the common good by casting their votes..." But in order to arrive at the polling station as well informed as possible, it's important to know our prospective MP's views on the things that matter to us.

This is not about political affiliations, but rather about strengthening community participation as a local faith group and practicing the culture of encounter that Pope Francis talks about. "With our faith we must create a 'culture of encounter,' a culture of friendship, a culture in which we find brothers and sisters, in which we can also speak with those who think differently." With over five million Catholics in the UK, the next general election is an opportunity to bring attention to the big issues of our time.

Using your voice and your vote from an informed perspective.

Last month, CAFOD and SVP collaborated to equip individuals and parishes with training to help in preparation for speaking to their candidates on the issues that matter. We have prepared resources to help to inform you and suggest questions to ask your candidate on a number of topical issues like those mentioned below.

Here at home in the UK we have the cost-of-living crisis that is seeing ever growing numbers of people struggling to make ends meet and provide food for their families turning to local foodbanks. The rising statistics of children living in poverty and the increasing costs of energy that puts added strain on already overstretched budgets, are just some of the issues.

Then there are the desperate situations caused by armed conflicts raging in countries around the world, the effects of the climate crisis on people's lives and livelihoods, global hunger, migration and asylum, the debt crisis faced by many countries, business and human rights, building resilient communities and tackling regional inequalities.

Many SVP members and CAFOD supporters have been involved in volunteering or campaigning for many years on issues such as poverty, food and climate. In 2021 parishes were closed and the country was in the thick of Covid 19. Yet parishioners across the country organised themselves to have meetings with their MPs and to discuss vital issues which were affecting the world during the pandemic. The greater the number of parishes contacting local candidates, the stronger our Catholic voice will be locally!



These are the Seven Principles of Public Life outlining the ethical standards that those working in the public sector are expected to adhere to. They were first set out by Lord Nolan in 1995 in the first report of the Committee on Standards in Public Life and they are included in a range of codes of conduct across public life.

CALLED TO BE PEACEMAKERS: A Catholic approach to arms control and disarmament published by the Department of International Affairs of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales

The publication affirms that:

'As Christians, we are called by Jesus to be peacemakers (Matthew 5:9) In the modern world, an integral aspect of this mission involves working to limit the proliferation of weapons and advancing the cause of global disarmament' and that 'these challenges are relevant to the mission of the Catholic Church in England and Wales today'.

Pax Christi UK writes: We welcome the publication and are grateful for its clarity on a number of issues which are key to our work and campaigns. The Bishops are calling, for example, for the UK

Government to fulfill its obligations under the nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty, to sign and ratify the Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons and to promote an end to the UK's role in the global arms trade. They urge the Government to take meaningful steps towards General and Complete Disarmament and, in particular, to support a new UN Special Session on Disarmament. This is something we are currently involved in calling for with Scrap Weapons

The Bishops ask us, with them, to support the diversion of military spending towards spending on peace and integral human development which will be one of the key calls we will be making in the upcoming General Election.

They promote the principles of 'Mensuram Bonam' in relation to investment in the arms industry which will be a support in all campaigns arguing for divestment by Catholic investors from any companies involved in the arms trade or the development and manufacture of nuclear weapons.

In their concluding reflection, the Bishops remind us that Jesus marked out the path of nonviolence. We believe, of course, that it is along this path that we can find the fresh hope, energy and tools we need to eventually put an end to war. This truly is the 'radically counter-cultural approach' the Bishops refer to in their conclusion and we invite everyone to join us who wants to explore that approach further and work for its realisation.

MAKING MONEY WORK FOR GOD'S CREATION

We all know that money has power. And that power can either be harnessed for good or used to fuel harm. We might think carefully about how we manage our own money – perhaps through giving to charitable causes, buying fair-trade, or using an ethical

bank – but how often do we review the impact that our churches' and faith institutions' money is having?

And if and when we do, how do we even start going about making this money work for the benefit of God's creation? Thankfully, these questions were tackled head on at our conference late last year – held in Central London in partnership with our friends at FaithInvest – called, **Church Investments in Climate Solutions: Financing a Liveable Future.**

The entire event was filmed and has now been turned into a series of five, free-to-access films that aim to guide you along your journey towards investing for positive environmental impact.




"How can Christians welcome refugees? Stories from Beirut and **Bristol**" Monday 17 June, 6-7.15pm

NOW IS THE TIME TO PREPARE!!

Celebrating The Season of Creation 2024 "To hope and act with Creation"

The Season of Creation runs from 1 September until 4 October, the Feast of St Francis of Assisi. It is a time of ecumenical celebration when we reflect on God's generosity

in giving us our beautiful world and we are inspired to protect it. Modern media have given us an unrivalled opportunity to see the huge diversity of landscapes, flora and fauna on the planet but, equally, they have shown us the devastation that has occurred when we have taken it for granted.

The theme for The Season of Creation this year is "To hope and act with Creation". It is inspired by Romans 8:19-25. This biblical image pictures the Earth as a Mother, groaning as in childbirth. Saint Francis of Assisi understood this when he referred to the Earth as our Sister and our Mother in his Canticle. Today, we no longer see the Earth as a gift from our Creator, but rather as a resource to be used. "Creation is groaning" (Rom 8:22) because of our selfishness and our unsustainable actions that harm her. Along with our sister, Mother Earth, creatures of all kinds, including humans, cry out because of our destructive actions causing a climate crisis, loss of biodiversity, and human suffering.

We have celebrated Creation in my own parish for the last four years. It has always been joyful and inspiring and brings home to parishioners the simple idea that we protect what we value and we value what we experience. If we never celebrate the natural world, what hope do we have of protecting it? We need to prepare NOW if we are to celebrate the season properly and not to suddenly realise that we have been overtaken by the summer holidays! Let us think about how we might celebrate both in our own churches and with the other Christians in our neighbourhood.

In our own churches, we can have a Creation weekend when our Masses have the theme of caring for Our Common Home. When thinking of decoration, the fruits of the harvest have their place, but it is much more than a simple harvest celebration. Let's not forget the mosses and the ferns. Let us display pictures of fish, and invertebrates such as bugs, beetles, bees, butterflies and spiders - all part of God's wonderful web of life. A friend said "We have a Christmas Crib, an Easter Garden, so why not have a Bug Hotel to celebrate Creation?"

The Season provides a great opportunity to grow our community by engaging with our parishioners, schools and perhaps with those who use our parish facilities. We might have a picnic, a soup lunch or other simple meal; an art or photographic exhibition celebrating all that is wonderful in our local area. Maybe a family fun night celebrating the individual actions that we already take. Such an evening might include a meat-free meal, an environmental quiz and some folk songs with sing- along choruses to remind us a way of life that was more at one with nature.

It should not be a one-off celebration, but a turning point in our relationship with our planet and all the species, including ourselves, who depend on it. We could invite individuals or groups to make pledges, for instance, an individual or a family might pledge to reduce the amount of meat they eat, walk to church or take a bus instead of the car.

The parish or school might register for the CAFOD Live Simply award, hold a tree planting or commit to having only reusable utensils at parish events. These are just some ideas. Our parishes are rich in talent. May we use the Season of Creation to release our own creativity.

A CHURCH WITH PEOPLE AT THE MARGINS

In Autumn 2022, when issues of the Cost of Living Crisis were prominent, a group of our members challenged the North Western Synod of the United Reformed Church to prioritise working with people who are poverty experienced or marginalised. This Spring our Synod Meeting adopted our strategy "A Church with People at the Margins" which sets out how together as a

Synod and in our individual churches we seek to work with people who are poverty experienced or marginalised by society. You can read or download the Strategy from our website.

Our strategy is rooted in Biblical stories:

- * the creation of all people in the image of God,
- *the call of the prophets to justice and peace,
- * the Gospel examples of Jesus meeting the needs of the sick and hungry and walking with those marginalised from society.

It is based on the key principles of listening and responding to those who are poverty experienced or marginalised. We would like to enable all people to live in community with Dignity, Agency, and Power. In this we draw on the work of Church Action on Poverty who supported us in developing this strategy. In the strategy we challenge our member churches to work with their local communities and particularly people within those communities who experience disadvantage. The choice of the word WITH is important to our thinking and emphasises our intention to value the views of all people as equals. We must not assume that we know best and can do things to or for people in our communities.

This is underpinned by a set of principles we are encouraging all of our churches to observe. Principles about listening, partnership, generosity, and in service through both in compassion by walking with people in need but also in seeking justice. As a Synod in adopting this strategy we have committed to support and equip all churches to be able to offer their mission and ministry consistent with these principles. Covering an area from Greater Manchester to the Scottish Border, we have also committed to prioritise our resources to support our churches who serve in the areas of the most significant deprivation. There are just over 100 churches in our Synod and over a third of them, according to data produced by the Church Urban Fund, are located in the 10% most deprived areas of England.

The adoption of the strategy is the beginning of a journey for us and one we want to learn from and work with others who share our commitment to improve the lives of people in our communities who are marginalised or economically disadvantaged.

SYCAMORE GAP AND LIVING SIMPLY

Many of us were outraged at the felling of the "iconic" tree at Sycamore Gap on Hadrian's Wall in an act of vandalism. It was just one sycamore, but we cared because it was a beautiful tree in a glorious position in our own locality. (photo by David Head)

Far away, in the Amazon, millions of trees and the wonderful plants and animals that depend on them are destroyed each year, not as acts of vandalism, but as acts of greed. The indigenous peoples, "the guardians of the rainforest", are driven from their land and their leaders subjected to intimidation and sometimes murdered. Injustice is rampant.

The main perpetrators are the meat and extractive industries, particularly gold mining. The meat industry clears the forest for cattle ranching or to grow soybeans for animal feed. Gold mining creates huge amounts of spoil and pollutes rivers with toxic mercury waste. On the other side of the world, in Borneo, the rainforest and its Orang-utan habitat is being destroyed for palm oil plantations.

Pope Francis takes us to task for this destruction: "Each year sees the disappearance of thousands of plant and animal species which we will never know, which our children will never see because they have been lost forever. The great majority become extinct for reasons related to human activity. Because of us, thousands of species will no longer give glory to God by their very existence. We have no such right". (Laudato Si'#33)

The sad thing is that the destruction is unnecessary. It occurs to satisfy the lifestyles of the well- off - and that includes ourselves. The very profitable burger industry has an insatiable demand for cheap beef, whilst the pork and poultry industries import huge amounts of soybean from the Amazon for feed. According to the gold industry's own statistics, nearly 90% of the gold mined today will end up as bullion in bank vaults or as jewellery - icons of wealth and status. The Golden Calf is alive and well.

Is this what life is about - the frantic race to eat more, own more? Surely, true living is about peace, contentment and wholesome relationships. It is about living simply, sustainably and in solidarity with Jesus' particular friends, the poor. It is about gratitude, not "attitude". As Pope Francis puts it: "Christian spirituality proposes an alternative understanding of the quality of life, and encourages a prophetic and contemplative lifestyle, one capable of deep enjoyment free of the obsession with consumption" (Laudato Si' # 222).

In November 2022, the Catholic Bishops' Conference of England and Wales published four "Resolutions on Environmental Matters". The first re-iterates observing the Friday abstinence from meat, recognising the environmental impact of meat production; doing so as an act of solidarity with those who face hunger and poverty every day; and dedicating to God the pressing need for us all to live more simply. The third states: The Bishops' Conference commends the LiveSimply award as a response to Pope Francis' invitation in Laudato Si "to work with generosity and tenderness in protecting this world which God has entrusted to us". Recognising that some schools and parishes may already have similar projects ongoing, the bishops encourage all remaining schools and parishes to consider signing up to this award as a sign of their solidarity with the poor and their desire to live in harmony with God's creation.

Wow! What a challenge!......But as a member of a parish which has the award, I can say that getting started was not too daunting as we were doing much of what was required anyway, but it provided a fresh focus for doing more. There is plenty of help and guidance available from people who have been through the process. A good start might be to put it on the agenda for the next parish Pastoral Council meeting. St Francis of Assisi said "Preach the gospel at all times. Use words if you have to". Living simply provides an eloquent statement of gospel values in our distracted world. Meanwhile, let us contemplate and celebrate God's wonderful gift of creation, especially in our own diocese, and seek to protect what is good and beautiful in our world, including sycamores!

CAFOD Update: Sudan Crisis

Sudan is in a crisis. Over half the country's 25 million population urgently needs humanitarian aid. Nearly 18 million people are struggling with acute hunger. UN figures have referred to the crisis as

"one of the worst humanitarian crises in recent memory, with potential to trigger the world's largest hunger emergency." Church leaders who are working alongside those most affected have expressed their concern at the unfolding humanitarian crisis. CAFOD's local Church partner, Caritas Sudan, has described the situation as a forgotten crisis that the international community urgently needs to address.

In a statement, Caritas Sudan said: "The ongoing crisis, compounded by security and administrative challenges, is preventing humanitarian aid reaching everyone who needs it. The coming rainy season between June and October-November will only make the situation worse." Pope Francis has repeatedly appealed for a negotiated solution to the conflict, and during his address on Christmas Day he recalled the suffering of the people of Sudan and asked the international community not to forget them. CAFOD is urgently working to address this crisis. We've allocated over £250,000 towards Sudan, providing essential sanitation and hygiene services, as well as emergency cash payments, to refugees and displaced people.

Things you can do

We at CAFOD are calling on all our supporters to pray for the people of Sudan and peace for their country.

Your support is also vital to continue the work of our local experts in Sudan and its surrounding countries, who are providing practical help to families affected by the conflict. Caroline Ward writes:

Friends of the Holy Land was established in 2009 and is an ecumenical, non-political charity. We work to support the lives and witness of Christians living in the Holy Land through prayer and practical projects, recognising that their presence in the land where Jesus once walked is an important witness to all Christians. Our mission is to secure a resilient and enduring Christian community in the West Bank, Gaza, Israel and Jordan.

We fund a mixture of sustainable and immediate relief work and our beneficiaries come from all Christian communities in the Holy Land. A network of lay and clerical professionals, rooted within the Christian community in the Holy Land verify our projects and beneficiaries. They quickly identify cases where our support has the potential to make the Christian community stronger and more resilient. Our mission is to secure a resilient and enduring Christian community in the West Bank, Gaza, Israel and Jordan.

We achieve support for our mission in the UK in four main ways:

- We raise awareness: of the challenges faced by Christians in the Holy Land
- Prayer: we encourage prayer on their behalf
- Fund Raising: we generate funds to provide practical help
- Pilgrimage: we encourage visits to the Holy Land to meet local Christians

Our work focuses on five key areas:

- Education
 Employment
 Health
- Housing improvement Emergency Support

The war in Gaza has devastated the community. There were approx. 1000 Christians in Gaza at the start of October. Some have been lucky enough to leave but most are sheltering at the Holy Family Church (Latin parish) or St Porphyrios (Greek Orthodox).

Many have no homes to return to. The effects have been much wider reaching than just Gaza. The West Bank has been locked down. Borders have closed. Tourism has stopped. Estimates suggest over 200,000 people lost their jobs in the West Bank, about 24% of employment (International Labour Organization). But most of all there is fear. Fear of escalating violence, fear of being shot or attacked, fear of demonstrations and indiscriminate arrest and fear of an uncertain future.

The most important thing Friends of the Holy Land are doing during this time is being in contact with our team and continuing to fund our projects as well as looking to new projects. We cannot change the situation, but we can make it a bit more bearable by giving our support - practically, prayerfully and emotionally.

We speak to our team and Committee in the Holy Land several times a week. We let them know that they are being remembered in prayer by Christians all over the world, as well as the financial support being offered.

The people of the West Bank are proud of their heritage and where they live; they don't like making their tragic circumstances public. They do not want sympathy from us, they do want practical help.

Friends of the Holy Land has sent £120,000 of aid directly to the Christian communities in Gaza. We have increased emergency support in the West Bank. We are exploring more projects to support employment and healing of the most vulnerable, including psychosocial interventions for trauma support, scholarships for vocational training, water projects to replace rusty tanks and enable access to clean water and employment and empowerment opportunities for women and young people.

We want to help the Christian community to rebuild a sustainable future to remain in the Holy Land.

New Chairman to guide us through the challenging times ahead. Sadly, Jim Quinn has retired as both a Trustee and our Chairman in April. Jim had been a Trustee since 2013 and we are most grateful for his many years of guidance and dedicated service, helping Friends of the Holy Land grow to where it is today. We are very pleased to announce that the Rt Rev William Kenney has agreed to take over the role as our chairman, with immediate effect. An Auxiliary Bishop Emeritus of the Archdiocese of Birmingham, +William is well known for his work internationally, especially the Middle East, being involved for many years with the Holy See's Holy Land Coordination.
