CHRISTIAN AID: SUSPENDING 'SOME' ARMS SALES TO ISRAEL NOT ENOUGH

British foreign secretary David Lammy announced today that the UK will suspend some arms sales to Israel. Mr Lammy said the decision follows a review of export licences for UK arms, which found there was a "clear risk" that they might be used to commit "a serious violation of international humanitarian law". Around 30 of 350 licences will be suspended, Mr Lammy said, stressing that "this is not a blanket ban, this is not an arms embargo".

Responding to the news, international development agency Christian Aid's Head of Middle East Policy, William Bell, said: "While this is progress, it does not go far enough. The only way to categorically ensure that arms sold to Israel are not used in violations of human rights is with a total ban. With the growing threat of this war escalating further, we need urgent steps to end the suffering and to build a world where Palestinians and Israelis are treated as equals."


The UK Government has granted 20 companies arms export licences to Israel since the Hamas attack on 7 October, with more companies awaiting their applications to progress since 31 May. The information was acquired through freedom of information by Christian Aid. The charity, which supports partners in Gaza to provide humanitarian aid, says it condemns companies that "make profit from this war."

The Department for Business and Trade (DBT), the department that issued the response, noted "a licence being granted does not mean that an export takes place...some licences may expire unused, and others may expire after only partial use." The items and financial value of licences are exempt from disclosure but are published in the quarterly arms export licences statistics. https://www.indcatholicnews.com/news/50549

NEW REPORT ON THE INFLUENCE OF THE UK ARMS INDUSTRY ON GOVERNMENT

The Campaign Against Arms Trade (CAAT) and the World Peace Foundation will be launching a new report on the influence of the UK arms industry on government on Wednesday, 18 September, 19:00-20:30, with a hybrid panel discussion, in Whitechapel, London, and online.

The report, by CAAT's Research Coordinator Dr. Sam Perlo-Freeman, is entitled "From revolving door to openplan office: the ever-closer union between the UK government and the arms industry".

It details the various channels of influence the arms industry is able to bring to bear on government, such as the revolving door, lobbying meetings with ministers and senior officials, and dedicated government-industry forums, and details how, over the past few decades, the arms industry has been drawn into such a close relationship with government as to blur or even erase the boundaries between the two. This ensures top arms companies a guaranteed stream of lucrative MOD contracts, despite persistent failures in delivery, and a highly permissive arms export regime, allowing sales to continue to Saudi Arabia and Israel in spite of the horrific human cost.

The launch will take place at 4th Floor Studios, 255-259 Commercial Road, Whitechapel, E1 2BT, and online via Zoom webinar. Registration (details below) is required for both in-person and online attendance. The venue is fully wheelchair-accessible.

DESTITUTE AND IN DANGER; PEOPLE MADE HOMELESS BY THE ASYLUM SYSTEM

A new report from Jesuit Refugee Service UK examines the experiences of homelessness among people refused asylum in the context of the cost-of-living crisis and following the COVID-19 pandemic. It is based on surveys conducted with people refused asylum living across different areas of London and supported by JRS UK, in Autumn 2023. People refused asylum are made destitute by government policy. They have no recourse to public funds, like nearly all asylum seekers, they are banned from working, and all support from the Home Office is cut off.

The research found that rough sleeping is very common among this group, and even those not currently street homeless are perpetually at risk of it. Connected to this, there is a widespread pattern of couch-surfing punctuated by sporadic street homelessness, and generally unstable accommodation situations. People had no choice over where they slept, very little control over their daily lives, and had to accept a roof over their head on whatever terms available.

This situation was very dangerous: Over 20% of respondents did not feel physically safe around people they lived with or around. There are indications of people living in unsafe or exploitative situations in the informal renting market, or of being trapped into abusive relationships. Joyce, a destitute asylum seeker, said: "For women, it can be even worse because some men take advantage of them because they are vulnerable. They sometimes end up forcing themselves into relationships they don't want to be in so they have a roof over their heads."

The report also highlights that destitution both has a negative impact on both physical and mental health. There were strong indications this was actively dangerous to individuals who already had serious health problems. One woman who only had one kidney described her fear and helplessness living in a situation where she was disproportionately at risk of infection: "There was a time I think I have an infection...I've got one kidney. I have to be very careful."

People explained that it was nearly impossible to manage long-term health conditions because they were homeless, and this put their health at risk. For example, destitution makes it harder to regulate medication: "I'm sleeping rough in parks, buses, trains. I find it difficult because of my medical issues as I'm on a lot of medication. What about if I lose my medication? I think it may cause some complications because some of the medication [is] not supposed to be missed."

Almost universally, long-term destitution in the context of asylum is very detrimental to mental health. Respondents reported anxiety, chronic sleep deprivation, and suicidal ideation.

Sarah Teather, Director of JRS UK, said: "For years, JRS UK have supported people made destitute by the asylum system - and we see the crushing impact destitution has on them. This new report shares their stories, and the reality it reveals is horrifying. People who sought safety here are plunged into homelessness and danger, left vulnerable to exploitation, abuse, and life-threatening illness. This is not new. Some people we work with have lived like this for decades, as an intentional consequence of successive governments' policies. This must, finally stop. The government has an opportunity to take a new approach. It must now end the Hostile Environment and enforced destitution."

Dr Sophie Cartwright, author of the report, said: "The enforced destitution of people refused asylum is shameful. People who just wanted to be safe are pushed, by government policy, to the very edges of society. They have no safe way to meet their basic needs and no home. They regularly have nowhere they can rest, or go just to feel secure. This is not human. It's not who we are. If any of us were forced to leave our home, we would all want somewhere to be safe. We would all want a chance to rebuild our lives. It's time to make that happen."

Each year from September 1 to October 4, the Christian family unites for this worldwide celebration of prayer and action to protect our common home. It is a special season where we celebrate God as Creator and acknowledge Creation as the divine continuing act that summons us as collaborators to love and care for the gift of all that is created. As followers of Christ from around the globe, we share a common call to care for Creation. We are co-creatures and part of all that God has made. Our well-being is interwoven with the well-being of the Earth.

We rejoice in this opportunity to safeguard our common home and all beings who share it. Our final event will be a **Prayer Service** on 4th October, the Feast of St, Francis, the patron saint of ecology, at St. Michael's Church at 7.30pm, which will be led by Rev. Dr. Marion Tugwood, chaplain at East Cheshire Hospice.

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LAUDATO SI' ANIMATORS WRITE TO PRIME MINISTER

Fifty-five Laudato Si' Animators, representing all parts of the United Kingdom, have written an open letter to the Prime Minister Sir Keir Starmer, and the ministers responsible Steve Reed and Ed Milliband. They call on the government to:

- 1. Introduce the Climate and Nature Bill which 60,000 marched for at Restore Nature Now. This bill would address many issues of concern e.g. reducing greenhouse gases, ending fossil fuel extraction, restoring ecosystems.
- 2. Commit to a transition from animal agriculture to organic, arable agriculture. Animal agriculture is a leading cause of many present world crises climate change; antibiotic resistance; waste of resources and global hunger (food, land, water and energy are wasted in growing food for animals to eat).
- 3. Commit to the signing of the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty (FFNPT), a proposed international agreement that aims to control fossil fuel production and infrastructure expansion, and phase out fossil fuel use in a fair and equitable way. The treaty would also accelerate the transition to clean energy and economic diversification away from fossil fuels. In 2023 Pope Francis called for "the elimination of fossil fuels, and education in lifestyles that are less dependent".
- 4. Support rewilding and in particular the Rewilding manifesto.
- 5. Ensure businesses pay for their pollution, and transition to non-polluting practices and products.

They state: "We believe that climate change is now such a threat to humanity that it should not be the subject of policies of individual political parties, but that all the parties should work together to find solutions to the problem for the common good and for the sake of our children's children.

"Pope Francis issued a papal document *Laudate Deum* in October 2023 which gives a clear warning about what needs to be done urgently.

"We are sending you a photo from the march in June and a copy of a special painting by professional artist Helen Elwes who is one of the Animators which we hope you will put on your desk as a reminder that we all need to think and act to care for our common home." https://www.indcatholicnews.com/news/50561

HELP END THE UNJUST TWO-CHILD LIMIT

Liam Purcell, Church Action on Poverty writes:

Churches around the UK are joining calls for an end to the UK's highly controversial two-child limit. Ask your church to sign the letter today.

The two-child limit means families are not allowed to access support through Universal Credit or Child Tax Credit, for more than two children, if children were born after April 2017.

The limit was introduced in 2017, and was unprecedented in the UK social security system, in creating differing support levels, based on sibling numbers. It has long been opposed by church leaders and charities on moral reasons, and is described by Save The Children as a sibling tax.

Today, 1.6 million children in 440,000 households are affected, and families are being denied access to £3,455 a year.

Churches have always been among the most vocal critics of the policy. The effort is being stepped up now because the new Government has launched a Child Poverty Strategy, and there are hopes that Ministers might heed the growing calls. We hope the policy will be removed in the Budget in October.

WORLD WEEK OF PRAYER FOR PEACE IN PALESTINE AND ISRAEL

16-22 SEPTEMBER 2024



"Whatever you did...you did for me" Matthew 25:40

The World Council of Churches invites faith-based communities around the world to join in a Week of Prayer for Peace in Palestine and Israel from 16 to 22 September.

This year's theme is based on Matthew 25:35-40. It challenges us to ask whether we act positively or negatively – 'as if we are doing it to Jesus' – and reminds us of the urgent need to work and pray for peace.

'For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was sick and you looked after me, I was in prison and you came to visit me... ... Whatever you did...you did for me'.

LIVING TOGETHER MEANS SERVING ONE ANOTHER

A reflection on the present situation in the ongoing conflict in the Holy Land needs to be founded on some fundamental principles.

First, Israel has a right to exist on the basis of the United Nations Resolution 181 dating from 1947.

Second, millions of Palestinians were dispossessed of their homes, their land, and their fundamental freedoms due to the creation of the State of Israel in 1948.

Standing as we do now, nine months into a terrible war in Gaza, and 58 years into Israel's occupation of the West Bank and Gaza, there is still a very long way to go before the people of Israel and Palestine will be able to live alongside one another in freedom, equality and security.

It must also be understood that the Israeli occupation of the West Bank from 1967, and the blockade of Gaza since 2007, are injustices that have compounded the previous dispossessions.

There is no going back: we have to go forward.

There has been enough violence, hatred and division in Israel and Palestine to last more than a lifetime. It is made all the more painful because of the significance that Jerusalem, and all the land, holds for the people of the Abrahamic faiths. Jews, Christians, and Muslims all revere the land. They feel spiritually rooted in it because of the events of salvation history for each faith that have taken place there.

There is enough religious fervour to sustain this conflict for generations to come. People of faith need to dig deep to find the best spiritual wisdom that each faith contains to discover how to live together in tolerance and equality. Living together means serving one another.

Ultimately, we will discover a better way when the peoples of the land can say "I belong to Jerusalem" rather than "Jerusalem belongs to me."

POEMS FROM THE CHILDREN OF GAZA

A new book, *Moon Tell me Truth*, is a collection of illustrated poems created last year by children from Gaza for a competition run by the Hands Up Project, a British educational charity that links children from other countries with young people in Gaza via the internet, using drama and story-telling to foster creativity, mutual understanding and friendship.

Most students featured in the book are now displaced and their schools have been damaged or destroyed. Two of the young poets were killed by Israeli airstrikes in October 2023 – Obada, 14, and Fatema, 9, along with all her family.

Fatema's poem *Eyes are for looking* has been shared all over the world.

Eyes are for looking
And seeing sun
Tongues are for greeting
And saying fun
Legs are for walking slowly
And also run
Hands are for shaking with friends
Not for shooting gun

Roa'a, aged 13, writes:

My darling's face is sad.
The moon's face in our homeland is sad.
Sad you are my city
... you the spring of tears and a long sad history
... you are the painting of pain and expressions of pain.
Your eyes have the green colour of olives
and the blue colour of sea
... while the night falls over the face of life.
Darling: wipe out that sadness
and weave the dress of impossible from the tears.

SUMUD

Sumud is an Arabic word which means 'steadfastness'.

Sumud stands firm against the occupation of Palestinian lands and people. It chooses nonviolent advocacy for political change and 'resistance through existence': a determination to sustain normal daily life, such as the building and rebuilding of houses despite the risk of demolition; commuting for work or pleasure despite the aggravation of checkpoints; continuing to invest in education.

Steadfast God,
Strong and sheltering as the oak,

encourage your children, with your *Sumud*,
your constant presence,
your Just Being There.

We raise to you in prayer the suffering peoples in your Holy Land.
