This was the title of this year's National Justice and Peace Network Conference inspired by the words of Pope Francis in Laudato Si "Sunday like the Jewish Sabbath is meant to be a day which heals our relationships with God, with ourselves and with others and with the world" (para237)

Made for Love

Dr Ruth Valerio from Tearfund opened the weekend by looking at the Pope's encyclical in a practical way of everyday family life. Suggesting that to live out this integrated ecology where all people and all creation can flourish we need to consider three things:

- A radical reappraisal of consumerist culture
- lifestyle changes
- an inner ecological conversion.

We know that for the benefit of "the earth and the poor" there are changes we need to make she suggested to work at this we consider the process of moving from knowledge- to discipline -to habit. For example, we know that it would be better to walk or cycle than use the car, at first, we must discipline ourselves to change, allow more time, eventually though it will become a habit we won't think of the car for short trips.

discern and change, move ourselves to live differently and be merciful with our hands reaching out to those in need.

He warned that the planet's fresh air, water and biodiversity are all being undermined with consequences for the whole Earth community. Lamenting destructive practices of extractive industries, and describing the Amazon's three million indigenous people as "today's lepers, reduced to nothingness". He said he was not totally against mining, "but it must be done in a more respectful way, respecting international law".

Finding Joy

Kate Galloway the final speaker added to the discourse by urging that we live more sustainably and avoid a "privatised religion" which does not engage with the struggles of the most marginalised. There was a plea to support campaigns that challenge unjust and violent structures, and "to look outside the holy places for places where God's reign is breaking through" Examples in

Scotland ranged from anti-nuclear protests on the streets, churches opening their doors to asylum seekers and "querrilla" gardening.

Truth Commission

This presentation was a powerful example of how communities can work together for deep change - making that quote from Romero "we are not two categories of people" a reality.

It's a whole community initiative which gets together those directly involved in poverty with Charites and policy makers working as equals for local change.
