Help one another. This is what Jesus teaches us. This is what I do. And I do it with my heart.



Unlike single focus organisations justice and peace covers the whole spectrum, helping us see how these issues are closely connected.

What are the issues?

Some of the many issues which justice and peace groups are involved in include:



### **Personally:**

In my own life, being aware of the issues and what small changes can be made that contribute to building God's kingdom e.g. challenging racism, writing letters, living more simply.

## Locally:

You could be part of a local J&P or JPIC (Justice, Peace and the Integrity of Creation) group in your parish or deanery, or join a local ecumenical or interfaith group.

Or you may wish to focus on a particular issue through one of the many agencies and organisations in our network.

## Nationally:

Working for justice and peace often results in friends around the country and the globe!

National Justice & Peace Network encourages mutual support between grassroots activists and national agencies.
