"We Cannot Walk Alone" - Ecumenical Service to mark Refugee Week

Flintshire City of Sanctuary (FCOS) together with Cytun Mold (Churches Together) invites you to join into an ecumenical service to mark Refugee Week 2021: the ecumenical service at St.

David's Church in Mold will take place on Sunday, 20 June, 4pm. Followed by refreshments outdoors All Covid restrictions will be observed. The service will also be televised and recorded https://www.churchservices.tv/mold.

As part of the service, we invite you to share a story, remembering people with lived refugee experience as part of the prayer for the people.

At the centre of the service will be a Lampedusa cross, made by a carpenter in Lampedusa, Italy. The Lampedusa crosses were made by carpenter Francesco Tuccio in the aftermath of a boat tragedy in October 2013 when a wooden boat carrying 466 people from Somalia and Eritrea caught fire and sank near the island, drowning 311.

Also, FCOS have created a series of short films to capture the journey for sanctuary seekers and people in Wales and Flintshire since 2015 made by and with trustees, volunteers, supporters and people with lived experience. They take the viewer on a journey of understanding and provide a sense of direction for us all to walk together into the future, as community and individuals. Parishes Transforming Lives

The government has just announced a long-term future for Community Sponsorship of refugees – a national scheme co-designed and piloted by Catholic parishes.

JRS demands closure of Napier Barracks

Independent Catholic News writes: - 'The Jesuit Refugee Service UK has renewed their call for the immediate closure of Napier barracks in Kent, as the High Court today ruled the use of the site unlawful. JRS UK has found that victims of torture and trafficking are routinely transferred to Napier and that people in Napier tend to suffer rapid and serious deterioration in mental health. Furthermore, the site continues not to be COVID-19 secure.'

Kent Council refuses to accept more unaccompanied child migrants

This week, Kent County Council announced that it can no longer accept unaccompanied child migrants as their services are at breaking point for the second time in a year. According to The Guardian, from Monday 14th June they will no longer be able to meet their statutory duty to safely care for the children they support and can therefore accept no further new UASC arrivals until sufficient transfers have been made outside of Kent bringing numbers back to safe levels. Basically, what they need is for the Home Office to force other Local Authorities to take their fair share of Unaccompanied Asylum-Seeking Children (UASC). Bishops' Letter to Prime Minister ahead of G7 Summit

On Wednesday, ahead of the G7 Summit, bishops representing the Catholic communities of England, Wales and Scotland wrote to Boris Johnson to stress that we must work together to ensure a just and sustainable future for our global community.

4. Supporting the Homeless

Jon Kuhrt through Grace + Truth has written a blog entitled 'A day in the life of one church's response to homelessness. He talks about the vital role churches and faith groups have played in the 'Everyone In' policy adopted at the start of the pandemic. Over 40,000 homeless people went into emergency accommodation in hotels and B & B's. He then goes onto talk about how important it is that the same groups come up with an effective way of addressing and preventing rough sleeping. Peru: Coronavirus update from Columban Missionary in Lima

Fr Ed' O'Connell SSC is a Columban Father, born in Somerset and educated by the Salesians in Battersea. He has been working as a missionary priest in Lima, Peru, for 38 years. He has written a piece for ICN about the situation in regards to the Coronavirus in Peru. I am sure that, like myself, not many people would know that Peru has the highest rate of mortality from the pandemic in the world. Their Government announced that the number of deaths in Peru from coronavirus up to the 22 May was180,764 out of a population of 32,625,948.

Fr Ed talks about the work that the Columbans have been doing out there to help, and thanks all of the families across Ireland, England, United States, Australia and New Zealand who have

UN: Covid-19 pushes 100 million more workers into poverty

According to a UN labour agency report released this week, the disruptions caused by the Covid-19 pandemic have forced over 100 million more workers into poverty worldwide. "Five years of progress towards the eradication of working poverty have been undone, as working poverty rates have now reverted to those of 2015," the report said.

6. Addressing Global Hunger

The Vatican holds its third webinar ahead of the UN Food Systems Summit, and calls for world leaders to recognize and address the negative effects which conflict has on food insecurity. Cardinal Turkson stated that solutions to the food crisis must address the multitude of factors which lead to food insecurity, and create a global food system which is robust and sustainable. "Indeed, the peace of the world depends on how we deal with hunger in the world," he said. The full article can be found on Vatican News.

7. Palestine/Israel

Academics worldwide urge end to Israeli apartheid

ICN reports that more than 300 academic departments, programmes, centres, unions, and societies around the world have endorsed statements in support of Palestinian rights in response to Israel's violent attacks on Palestinians last month. The statements express solidarity with the Palestinian liberation struggle and condemn Israel's military assault on besieged Gaza, which killed more than 247 Palestinians, including 66 children, and violent attacks against Palestinians across the occupied West Bank, in particular in Sheikh Jarrah, and within present-day Israel. This is Palestine Revisited

Five years ago, John McColgan went to Palestine and Israel with Trócaire and with his brother Gerry he produced and presented a documentary called 'This is Palestine'.

On 26th May 2021 a motion was passed in Dáil Éireann, the Irish parliament, condemning the 'de facto' annexation of Palestinian land by Israel. The motion was passed unanimously. The vote was historic as it is the first time that an EU member state has spoken out so decisively and so clearly about the situation.

The documentary has been viewed online more than a million times and gave an insight into

the devastation and the horrors of the bombing at the time which John saw first-hand. In the aftermath of the latest round of horrific violence in Gaza which saw hundreds of people killed, the majority of them women and children, John and Gerry created an update to their documentary called 'This is Palestine – Revisited'. 28. Take Action for a People's Vaccine

At current rates of vaccination, the G7 countries will vaccinate their populations by 8 January 2022. It will take low-income countries 57 years to vaccinate theirs.

Using all capacity for vaccine production globally could make a huge difference. But the UK government is one of the handful of rich countries blocking a proposal at the World Trade

Organization to remove production monopolies from big pharma.

We need urgent action to put pressure on them. This summer, as many of us in the UK celebrate getting our jabs, we are demanding vaccines for all.

Take action with Global Justice Now.

29. Stop the Aids cuts

Disappointingly, there was no vote in parliament on the government's aid cuts this week. It does look like there is significant opposition to the cuts though.

On 7th June, Sir Lindsay Hoyle (Speaker of the House of Commons) judged that the amendment tabled by former development secretary Andrew Mitchell MP was not within the scope of the Advanced Research and Invention Agency Bill, and should therefore not be debated.

If approved, this amendment could have forced the government to return the aid budget to 0.7% of national income in 2022. With no vote yet offered by the government to MPs, those opposing the aid cuts felt this was a technical way of at least preventing further cuts next year. 30. Walk the Walk

Giant footprints on Cornwall beach urge G7 leaders to 'walk the walk' when it comes to the environment

A pair of giant footprints has appeared on the beach opposite this week's G7 summit in Cornwall, urging world leaders in attendance to 'walk the walk' when it comes to sustainability.

With climate change top of the summit's 'build back better' agenda, the footprints serve as a reminder for the seven nations to lead by example and commit to cutting carbon emissions now, rather than in the future.

Created by sustainable footwear brand Allbirds, the Gwithian Bay footprints represent carbon emissions per person in the G7 compared with the global average.

The difference is startling: the average person globally emits 4.7 tonnes of CO2 each year, whereas people living in G7 nations average 9.2 tonnes – almost twice as much.

Cornish sand artist One Man and His Rake created the installation; it is the latest carbon-

focused initiative from Allbirds, which operates in each G7 nation.
