PEACE DAY - 21ST SEPTEMBER 2021

Building Peace One Day at a Time

In 1999, actor turned filmmaker Jeremy Gilley set out to document his efforts to create an annual Peace Day. To this end he founded the non-profit organisation Peace One Day. In 2001 the organisation's efforts were rewarded when the member states of the United Nations unanimously adopted the first ever annual day of global ceasefire and non-violence on 21 September – Peace Day.

Since 2001, Peace One Day's objective has been to institutionalise Peace Day 21 September, making it a day that is self-sustaining, an annual day of global unity, a day of intercultural cooperation on an unprecedented scale.

To support this objective, in 2007, in Afghanistan, Peace One Day's collaboration with UNAMA, UNICEF, WHO and other UN agencies resulted in a ceasefire observed by all parties, including the Taliban. 4.5 million children were vaccinated against polio in Afghanistan due to Peace Day agreements.

In 2014 Peace One Day launched a 3-year project in the Great Lakes region of Africa. The goal was to raise awareness of Peace Day and encourage all sectors of society in the region to stand together in the name of peace on 21 September.

In 2016, after several years work with global management consulting firm McKinsey & Company, it was estimated that 2.2 billion people had been exposed to the Peace Day message, that 940 million were aware of the day and that 16 million behaved more peacefully as a result.

Through initiatives and collaborations, Peace One Day continues to encourage organisations and individuals to reduce violence at home, in the workplace, at school, in our communities and towards our environment.

Peace One Day's goal for 2025 is to reach 3 billion people with the message of Peace Day.

Peace One Day is impartial and independent of any government, political persuasion, corporation or religious creed.

1. COP26, Climate and Environment (includes Actions and Events)

UN Climate Change News - and it is not good news

On the 17th September, UN Climate Change published a synthesis of climate action plans as communicated in countries' Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs). The NDC Synthesis report indicates that while there is a clear trend that greenhouse gas emissions are being reduced over time, nations must urgently redouble their climate efforts if they are to prevent global temperature increases beyond the Paris Agreement's goal of well below 2C – ideally 1.5C – by the end of the century.

The Synthesis Report was requested by Parties to the Paris Agreement to assist them in assessing the progress of climate action ahead of the UN Climate Change Conference (COP26) this November in Glasgow, Scotland.

'Camino to COP' sets off from London

Ellen Teague writes through ICN on the 8th September: - Walkers set out from Parliament Square last Sunday, launching the 'Camino to COP'. Caministas from London, and another stream leaving Bristol on the 9 September, aim to arrive in Glasgow on 30 October on the eve of the United Nations Climate Summit. Banners and ribbons were waved as a lively 40-strong group, accompanied by a samba band, walked northwards through central London on the first day of the 500-mile pilgrimage. The purpose of the 'Camino' is to lobby world leaders meeting in Glasgow about the need for serious action to address the global climate and ecological emergency. Also, to share personal stories, to talk about climate justice and inspire others to add their voices to the growing global chorus demanding that governments treat the climate crisis as the emergency that it is.

Call for Climate Justice at COP26

Campaign Against Climate Change writes: - Ahead of the UN climate negotiations in Glasgow this November, climate activists around the world are raising the alarm about what has been called "the most exclusive COP ever". Delegates have been left waiting both for vaccinations promised by the UK government and even for information about arrangements. Faced with calls for <u>COP26 to be postponed</u>, the UK government have promised to pay for quarantine hotels. But many government delegates, civil society campaigners and journalists, particularly from Global South countries, will still be excluded. Even in 'normal' times, there is an imbalance of power with governments of wealthy countries dominating. What will these, even more unequal, climate talks mean for decisions on issues such as climate finance, loss and damage and carbon market rules, and the impact on the world's poorest?

and plant trees together beginning from September 1st, the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation.

Monsignor Enrique Figaredo, apostolic prefect of Battambang, said 'Even though we have different faiths, nationalities, ethnic groups and cultures, we are human beings, all called to work together for unity and solidarity.'

Pax Christi Peace Pilgrimage - witnessing against the Arms Fair

Ann Farr, Chair of Pax Christi England and Wales, writes through ICN: - This week the DSEI Arms Fair took place at the ExCeL Centre in East London. Arms manufacturers, governments and military met against the displays of the most lethal weapons available in the world. There were games, like 'guess how many bullets in the jar' and giveaways included rubber stress balls in the shape of hand grenades!

On Tuesday, the opening day, peace activists gathered in many different parts of the site and its access points. Silent groups blocked station entrances to the centre and first thing in the morning, Quakers held a Meeting for Worship near the main entrance. Please read Ann's full article through <u>ICN</u>. The peace activists were thoroughly drenched through the day due to the weather, but were undeterred. Ann finishes with:

- Despite all the difficulties of travel and access it was clear that there is a huge public will to stop the manufacture and sale of weapons of death and destruction. People were prepared to make long journeys, stand for hours, walk in the rain and be present. Behind all those who were there, were hundreds of others in families, parishes and religious communities around the country who were in solidarity with us. We are grateful to them for their messages, their prayers, for being with us in spirit. Together, we continue in our commitment to stop the arms trade.

4. Human Trafficking

Nepal - preventing trafficking

If you receive regular updates from Anti-Slavery International, you would have got the following from Paul, who told the story of Soneeya *(warning contains details of sexual violence)*: -

"When I was 15, my parents and relatives arranged my marriage. They didn't ask me if I wanted to get married. I was shocked and terrified. I had never even met the man I was to marry. He was 28 – 13 years older than me. They forced the decision on me. "For five days everything was fine. The next night he came home, he tied my arms and legs like an animal. Then he raped me. After that he used to come home drunk every night, beat me and rape me.

"When I got pregnant at 16, I was really scared. He threw 3,000 rupees at me and told me to get an abortion. I went to the hospital, but I couldn't go through with it. When I went home and told my husband, he beat me with a belt until I was rescued by his brother. After that my husband left.

"My son is 11 years old now and I am proud of him. I'm so happy I brought up my son independently. I'm filing for a divorce and am proud to be able to sign the divorce papers and show my husband what I have become."

6. Life Issues

Life issues, such as Assisted Suicide, Abortion, and Suicide are always difficult to address as everyone has different opinions. Bishop's Open Letter on Assisted Dying Bill

The Assisted Dying Bill is due to be debated in the House of Lords in October. Bishop John Sherrington, Lead Bishop for Life Issues, has written an Open Letter asking for Catholics to pray for the defeat of this Bill. The letter suggests you might want to write to a member of the House of Lords, stating the reasons why they oppose this legislation and particularly explain from personal experience the reasons why this change in the law should be opposed. You can do that <u>here.</u>

Suicide and Young People

Joann Hitchen, from Papyrus: prevention of young suicide, spoke at the NJPN Networking Meeting last weekend, and shared this <u>video</u>. The young people wearing placards are all actors, but the people on the street are real, as are their reactions. I found this very emotional, mainly from the kindness that some people showed to the young person (actor) Another video was also shared, giving <u>Thirteen Reasons Why We Should Talk About</u> <u>Suicide Safely.</u>

Suicide is very much a taboo subject, despite it no longer being a crime. Many years ago, I was with someone who was going through a mental health crisis, and he was asked quite bluntly by the Team dealing with him if he was suicidal, and if so, how would he kill himself. I was horrified, and felt that they shouldn't put ideas into his head. But, as you will see from the video, it is far better to talk about it, or at least listen to someone.

The final video, <u>Sinking Feeling</u>, shows someone who is gradually sinking further and further down. I am sure at some point in our lives, we have all felt like that. At the end of the video we find out that suicide is the leading cause of young deaths in the UK. <u>Papyrus</u> do a great job in offering support and their Hope Line is open 24/7.

Can I ask that if you know any young people, please do forward this onto them. You may never know what that young person is going through, but you may just save their life.

7. What's causing structural racism in housing?

The Joseph Rowntree Foundation has come up with a report highlighting the inequalities that Black, Asian and minority ethnic communities face in accessing affordable and secure housing. They say that they are rooted in structural inequalities, such as that caused by the labour market, the social security system and the effects of hostile immigration policies.

27. THE LAST WORD

An urban myth or not...? A story.

This incident took place in a supermarket in New Jersey.

"At the supermarket today, I found a small, elderly woman standing in front of a high shelf holding Bonne Maman preserves. She was having trouble finding the flavour she wanted because the jars were set back on the shelf.

She couldn't read the labels. She could barely reach them. I offered to help.

After I handed her the raspberry preserves, she thanked me, paused, and then asked, "Do you know why I buy this brand?"

I laughed and replied, "Because it tastes good?"

"Yes, it tastes good." She paused again. "I am a Holocaust survivor."

This was not the conversation I expected on a Sunday grocery run. "During the war, the family that owns the company hid my family in Paris. So now I always buy it. And whenever I go to the store, my grandkids remind me, 'Bubbe, don't forget to buy the

jelly.'"

I told her that that was the best reason I ever heard to buy any company's product. And then we both smiled behind our masks and went our separate ways."

Someone else on Twitter looked into the story and indeed, the town that Andros Company, the makers of Bonne Maman, comes from, hid and saved Jewish families in WW2. It was called Biars sur Cere, which then had about 800 villagers. (also, there is a story <u>here</u> that seems to link the original makers of Bonne Maman to the Second World War)

From an article, "You have to understand what it was like then. There were posters on the walls, from the Nazis and from the collaborators, and they said that if you are found to help a Jew, a freemason, a communist, a socialist, or a pervert, you will be shot on sight." Despite the great danger in which helping them put the villagers in, still they kept the children safe."

A good reason to buy Bonne Maman products (obviously other products are available). And a poignant reminder that when we look out for each other it can change lives, and that there are good and selfless people in the world.
