REMEMBERING HIROSHIMA AND NAGASAKI 6 - 9 AUGUST

Over the next few days we will be remembering the bombing of Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 1945.

Pax Christi write: -

Current concerns over the possibility for storing US nuclear weapons at RAF Lakenheath and the war in Ukraine/Russia add extra impetus to this year's commemoration. We know of events taking place in Coventry, Liverpool and Westminster. Countdown to COP27

ICN have reported on the Campaigning Paper on Climate Change that the NJPN Environment Group have produced. They have stated how important it is that churches 'speak up and hold the Government to account.'

Amid a cost-of-living crisis and record-breaking temperatures, the next prime minister must prioritise affordable renewable energy and home insulation, not dangerous fossil fuel extraction.

Fracking won't meaningfully lower our energy bills. But it will be terrible for our climate.

Sewage Sleuths: the men who revealed the slow, dirty death of Welsh and English rivers

This Long Read from <u>The Guardian</u> is the story of Peter Hammond and Ashley Smith's investigation into the poisoning of Welsh and English rivers, after noticing that their local river, Windrush, had gradually lost all of its fish. It is a shocking tale of pollution and incompetency by the Environment Agency, OFWAT and various other bodies.

Action - Object to Drax's dangerous carbon capture plans

Biofuelwatch write: - The UK's single largest carbon emitter and the world's biggest tree burner, Drax, has applied to the Planning Inspectorate to add unproven carbon capture equipment to two of its wood-burning units at Drax Power Station near Selby in Yorkshire.

We believe that Drax does not have the technical know-how to successfully capture large amounts of CO2. Instead, we assume that Drax wants to obtain this planning consent in order to attract new subsidies and investments based on the promise of Drax becoming the first company in the world to develop a large-scale Bioenergy with Carbon Capture and Storage (BECCS) scheme. Drax's current subsidies (amounting to £982.5 million in 2021) are due to expire in 2027.

The Case for Climate Justice

Global Justice Now writes: - Earlier this week the government released its so-called Jet Zero strategy. The document is a risible piece of greenwashing which proposes that UK aviation continue to grow on the basis of non-existent clean technology and offsetting. It was somehow fitting, then, that on the very same day the UK recorded its highest ever temperature, 40.2C, at Heathrow Airport.

'Jet Zero' is the kind of dangerous fantasy you end up with when climate policies aren't allowed to break with big business as usual. It's clearer than ever that if we want to stop climate change, we need system change. To help push this message home, we're about to do a third print run of our hugely popular illustrated booklet, <u>The Case for Climate Justice</u>. If you'd

35 faith institutions announce divestment and call for no new fossil fuels

<u>Bright Now</u> have reported that 35 faith institutions, across seven countries, have announced their divestment from fossil fuels.

Their report says: - Both the International Energy Agency (IEA) and the UN have warned against new fossil fuel projects anywhere in the world, as scientists say we cannot safely burn the vast majority of fossil fuels still in the ground. Yet just nine months after world leaders pledged to 'keep 1.5 alive' at the COP26 conference in Glasgow, 20 fossil fuel companies – including Shell, Total, BP and ExxonMobil – are moving ahead with fossil fuel expansion plans totalling \$932 billion that would push the world past 1.5°C of heating.

Why cork is good for wildlife

This is targeted at all you wine enthusiasts out there who have been quite happy to accept metal screw caps on your bottles of wine. My rationale has been that you don't need to fiddle with getting a cork out, the wine is less likely to have been affected by a sub-standard cork, and it keeps the wine fresh if you are not drinking it all at once.

Imagine my shock when I was signposted to this article from the RSPB about the decrease of natural cork use in wine bottles, and how it presents a threat to the cork oak forests of southern Europe and the people and wildlife which depend on this ancient habitat and sustainable industry.

Sadly, like most things that we have got used to buying that have been designed for our convenience, there is a cost to the environment (and I am including plastic wrappings in this too). Read it through the <u>RSPB</u>.

3. Modern Slavery/Trafficking

Sir Mo Farah reveals he was trafficked as a child

This story is now a few weeks old, and if you haven't seen the BBC documentary (link to the BBC News story is here), you would have heard about it. By telling his story, Sir Mo has brought modern slavery and the things that go on into the consciousness of the British public, which can only be a good thing. Thanks to his PE Teacher, to whom he confided about his life, he was taken into care and fostered by a Somali family, and his life changed for the better. But it does make you ask the question, 'how many more are there just like him.' It is our duty to keep our eyes open...

It also likens his story to that of St. Josephine Bakhita and quotes Cardinal Vincent Nicholls.

Stella Maris chaplain receives major anti-trafficking hero award

Stella Maris reports: - Apinya Tajit, Stella Maris Deputy Director in Chanthaburi Diocese, Thailand, has received the U.S. Department of State 2022 Trafficking in Persons Report Hero Award for her dedicated and untiring work supporting trafficked fishers and seafarers.

4. Palestine/Israel (includes an Action)

Action - Boycott Puma Day of Action

Palestine Solidarity Campaign report on the latest attack by the Israeli forces on Gaza, which at the time they wrote it, had killed 15 people including a 5 year old child, and injured many more. At that point there had been no condemnation of the attack from anyone in Parliament - either Government or Shadow front bench. Without any form of sanctions against Israel, this will just continue. PSC is asking that you join their Boycott Puma Day of Action on the 10th September (Puma sponsors the Israel Football Association).

Holy Land: UN gravely concerned at escalating violence

<u>ICN</u> have reported on the statement that Lynn Hastings, UN Humanitarian Co-ordinator in the occupied Palestinian territory, issued on the 6th August concerning the escalating violence in the region.

5. Anthony McNicholl RIP

Tony McNicholl passed away peacefully at home on the 25th July 2022, after being diagnosed with idiopathic pulmonary fibrosis in May 2021. He was known through his work as the Diocesan Justice and Peace worker for Wrexham, and amongst other things supported CAFOD, Pax Christi and the Romero Trust. 6. Celebrate the Commonwealth Games and the Lionesses. Then fight for real diversity.

Anne Wafula Strike writes in <u>The Guardian</u> about the fact that too often minorities, such as women and people with disabilities, still find the odds are stacked against them. She comments on the lack of diversity in the England Women's Team and that more needs to be done to represent marginalised groups in sport.

7. Burma Military executes four activists (includes an Action)

Burma Campaign passes on the news that four democracy activists, Ko Jimmy, Phyo Zeya Thaw, Hla Myo Aung and Aung Thura Zaw, have been executed.

Burma Campaign write: - It has been decades since the Burmese military has carried out executions. The executions are a sign of desperation, not strength by the Burmese military, as they face growing resistance since the attempted coup began last year. The military is hoping they will terrify people into submission. It will not succeed.

"This is a desperately sad day for family and friends of those executed," said Wai Hnin Pwint Thon, Senior Advocacy Officer at Burma Campaign UK. "I have known Ko Jimmy my whole life, he was an inspiration to me. He dedicated his life to freedom and democracy for the people of Burma."

More details are available through Burma Campaign here. They want to encourage people to email Liz Truss, in her role as Foreign Secretary, to demand the expelling of the Burmese Attaché from the UK. They also want people to email the EU asking for more sanctions to be imposed on the Burmese military.

8. New evaluation shows benefits of scheme to keep women prisoners in touch with children

Pact, the Prison Advice and Care Trust, reports on a pilot scheme called 'Together a Chance' which is being run in HMPs Eastwood Park and Send. Social workers have been placed in both prisons whose role is to improve outcomes for mothers in custody and their children.

Pact write: - Unlike local authority social workers, Pact social workers are specialist prison-based staff, and their work begins with the women as their primary caseload. However, their work complements that of their local authority counterparts in safeguarding the best interests of the child, while also providing vital support for mothers, many of whom have been victims of violence and domestic abuse.

According to an interim report by the University of Cardiff the scheme is already 'yielding significant benefits.'

9. The goal is equality (includes an Action)

Cat Jenkins, from Church Action for Tax Justice, writes: - As I write, we're still in the relatively early stages of a two-horse Conservative leadership race and tax cuts seem to be high on the agenda for both Liz Truss and Rishi Sunak, the hopefuls.

It's clearly an important topic for Conservative politicians – perhaps more so than it is for the electorate, conservative or otherwise, in fact. Research from our friends at Tax Justice UK suggests that 'ordinary' conservative-voting people (as opposed to, say, conservative politicians) don't actually have that much appetite for tax cuts, especially if they mean that public services suffer. It seems reasonable to assume that other parties' constituents feel the same, and it does make you wonder whether politicians really understand what it is that the public value. We'd suggest that the majority support a system where taxes are levied, according to peoples' ability to contribute, so that everyone has a decent standard of living and opportunity to do well.

"13 Our desire is not that others might be relieved while you are hard pressed, but that there might be equality. 14 At the present time your plenty will supply what they need, so that in turn their plenty will supply what you need. **The goal is equality,** 15 as it is written: "The one who gathered much did not have too much, and the one who gathered little did not have too little." (2 Corinthians 8, my emphasis added).

Meanwhile, in the world of corporate taxation, it's a similarly bemusing story. In recent days, the biggest oil companies operating in the UK have declared their profits for the second quarter of the year – and yes, you guessed it, it's been another bumper season for them. Shell, for example, banked £9.4bn in Q2 of 2022 – twice what they made in the same period last year, and its highest single-quarter profit ever. Indeed, in the three months just gone, five of these oil and gas majors have collectively made over £50bn in profits.

Profit in and of itself isn't a bad thing. But what are these companies doing with their windfalls (and make no mistake, 'windfalls' is exactly what they are...)?

Finance Director, Murray Auchincloss, spoke recently of the possibility of "...getting more cash than we know what to do with". Mr Auchincloss, we'd like to offer some suggestions...

Christian values would suggest that those in positions of power – whether policy-makers, or those in charge of companies which dominate the economy – should be ensuring that those least able to defend themselves are treated fairly. Clearly that isn't happening – rather the opposite, and it puts me in mind of the words in Ezekiel 34:4, "The weak you have not strengthened, the sick you have not healed, the injured you have not bound up, the strayed you have not brought back, the lost you have not sought, and with force and harshness you have ruled them."

Where is the compassion and care for the vulnerable, in a society where corporate shareholders profiteer whilst ordinary families face the future with real anxiety? The recent 'windfall tax' announcement went some small way to recognising the inbuilt unfairness in this situation, but it fell far short of what's really needed. We'll keep campaigning for a better outcome for individuals and families, we promise you that.

Have you had the chance yet to encourage your MP to speak up for better tax justice, by way of a wealth tax on the richest 1% in the country? If not, we've made it as easy as can be for you – all you have to do is put in your postcode, and our <u>online toolkit</u> will find out who your MP is and provide a letter to her or him – which you're welcome to use 'as is', or adapt as you see fit. Please let your political representatives know that you care about these issues! **Cat**
