Embarking together on paths of peace

NEWS AND COMMENT

1. Climate/Environment (includes **Actions and an **Event**)**

Court finds three Christian climate campaigners not guilty

This was an interesting outcome, reported by [Independent Catholic News](#). Three climate campaigners, Ruth Jarman, Rev. Sue Parfitt and Benjamin Buse all joined in with the Insulate Britain protest at Cranford Parkway on the M4 in October 2021. This week they were found not guilty by the Jury at the Inner London Crown Court, despite the judge directing them to find the defendants guilty!

During their defence, they were each barred from referring to the climate crisis, insulation or fuel poverty. Despite all of this, the twelve members of the jury took the decision to find in their favour, and as Rev. Sue said *"Despite all the odds I am thankful that 12 of my fellow citizens were able to see the bigger picture and, even when directed by the judge to find us guilty, they were able to understand that the unprecedented times in which we live calls for us all to step out of the box and make courageous decisions. Thank you jury."*

"I think reasonable people can see that inconveniencing a few people on their way to work does not compare with the appalling threat to humanity caused by the blindness, stubbornness and greed of just a few people, including our government."

Maybe more people care than the Government, and often the media, have us believe.

'If you win the popular imagination, you change the game': why we need new stories on climate

This article was published in The Long Read this weekend by [The Guardian](#), and was written by Rebecca Solnit. She talks about needing a more artistic solution to climate change, one that will engage people more. The third paragraph reads: - *In order to do what the climate crisis demands of us, we have to find stories of a livable future, stories of popular power, stories that motivate people to do what it takes to make the world we need. Perhaps we also need to become better critics and listeners, more careful about what we take in and who's telling it, and what we believe and repeat, because stories can give power – or they can take it away.*

As it says, it is a long read, but you need to stick with it. There is a huge amount of information about where we were, where we are going and where we need to be - as well as talk of the greenwashing, mining of cobalt and lithium and the search for new battery materials. The last bit of the article nails it for me when Rebecca quotes Greta Thunberg, and a piece of writing by Octavia Butler.

The climate crisis is a problem with no single solution, but many, just as there is no one saviour, but many protagonists in the struggle. In 2019, Swedish climate activist Greta Thunberg said we must embrace “cathedral thinking”, adding: “We must lay the foundation while we may not know exactly how to build the ceiling.” The speculative fiction writer Octavia Butler included this passage in one of her essays:

“OK,” the young man challenged. “So what’s the answer?”

“There isn’t one,” I told him.

“No answer? You mean we’re just doomed?” He smiled as though he thought this might be a joke.

“No,” I said. “I mean there’s no single answer that will solve all of our future problems. There’s no magic bullet. Instead there are thousands of answers – at least. You can be one of them if you choose to be.”

Greenpeace 2023 Vision: The World We All Want to See

If you haven't seen it already, take a minute to watch this [Greenpeace](#) video, showing different generations and cultures saying what their vision for the world is. The video is nicely put together and pretty much sums up what we are all about.

Top ten climate disasters cost the world billions in 2022

Christian Aid issued a new report in December which identified the top ten costliest climate disasters in 2022, which each caused over \$3 billion of damage. It also reported on the top ten other extreme events that caused massive human and environmental damage, mostly in the poorest countries.

Christian Aid said: - *these extreme events highlight the need for more urgent climate action. They underline the importance of the loss and damage fund recently agreed at COP27 to provide financial support to people in developing countries who have suffered huge losses due to a climate crisis they have not caused. The international development charity is calling on world leaders to decide how the fund is managed and get money flowing into it.*

It certainly made me realise a couple of things...firstly, how little I knew about bees, and secondly, how we end up causing a problem with biodiversity by our desire to buy products that we want or that companies can make money out of. Action - Pesticide-Free Towns Pledge

This one came in courtesy of the Injustice Advent Calendar before Christmas, but as someone who has dogs, it is close to my heart. Every so often a note goes onto our local Residents Associate Facebook page advising people with dogs not to go to certain areas as the Council have been spraying pesticides there. You then notice the yellowing/dying back of verges etc. over the next week or so.

Profit before people and planet

Again, courtesy of [Christian Aid](#), a report on how the Brazilian Amazon and its people are being exploited. It particularly focuses on the bauxite mining company MRN. [ICN](#) quotes the report: - *MRN's mining operations in Oriximiná in the state of Pará have contributed to the deforestation of extensive areas of the Amazon Forest and serious adverse human rights and environmental impacts on Quilombola and riverine communities. MRN's mining operations have polluted watercourses, hindering the access of these communities to good quality water, generating diseases and impacting on fishing activity, and deforestation by MRN's mining operations has affected access to food and natural resources that support livelihoods for these marginalised communities.*

Action - Call on your MP to stop subsidies for Drax's tree-burning

Biofuelwatch have asked us to share this campaign. They write: - *Did you know that the UK Government is wasting £1.5 billion a year subsidising tree burning for electricity at power stations like Drax, with devastating impacts on forests, wildlife, communities and the climate?*

According to their article, Drax receives £2million every day from the UK Government to burn trees, and this is paid for through an extra charge on UK energy bills.

Home Office ignored Government warnings on climate threat to Rwanda deportees

This Press Release from Christian Aid dated the 19th December states that no risk assessment was carried out by the Home Office in regards to climate harms to refugees, despite a Government paper outlining the threat of major climate issues in Rwanda.

I am sure that some of you will disagree with the sentiment, but Jo's point of view certainly resonates with some stories that I have been told about how things have been in my area in local foodbanks and the like.

4. Palestine/Israel (includes **Actions and Events)**

What's Christmas like for Christians in Bethlehem today

[Embrace the Middle East](#) have shared this blog from Dr. Munther Isaac (who was mentioned in the last e-bulletin). Dr. Munther shares that, as a Palestinian, he is made to feel that he is illegally occupying land, but which the Palestinians have lived in for thousands of years.

A paragraph that sums up something many of us probably wouldn't have thought about: -

Christian Zionism is the most extreme expression of this. At the same time, there are many of what I call 'diplomatic churches', churches who pray for both sides and pray for peace and think that they are contributing to peace. But by not challenging Israel on its human rights abuses, breaking the International Law, and by looking at the conflict as if it's a conflict between equals, they are enabling the occupier. Today we are struggling, not just because of Christian Zionists but because of churches who are silent.

United Nations OCHA occupied Palestinian Territory

On 31st December, the [Facebook](#) page above advertised the Factsheet that they have produced, highlighting the humanitarian impact in the 20 years since the Barrier was constructed, which runs 700 kilometres, mostly inside the West Bank.

An article through [ICN](#) reports that *on the 30th December, the United Nations voted in favour of a resolution requesting the International Court of Justice to provide an advisory opinion on the legal nature of Israel's prolonged military occupation of the Occupied Palestinian Territory (OPT) and the responsibilities of third party-states.*


Urgent appeal as Israel announces forced eviction of entire village (includes **Actions**)

[ICN](#) reported on the 5th January that *the Israeli government had announced that the mass forced displacement of the entire community of Masafer Yatta in the Occupied West Bank - more than 1,000 residents, including women, children and elderly people, will happen in the next few days. The Israeli army has already supervised the demolition of hundreds of homes, destruction of wells, olive groves and confiscation of livestock in the area.*

I haven't found any more information out on the above, but included in the article is a template letter for lobbying elected reps and faith leaders in the UK or Ireland. Please get involved.
